a long series of developments which had made the parish a strong and contented one. On behalf of the parishioners he expressed his thanks to the Rector and all his predecessors for their efforts.

Dr. McMillan then introduced Very Rev. A. McLeellan, Rector of the parish, who said the Community Centre represented years of work and sacrifice by the people. He expressed his appreciation for the work of the various committees and extended a sincere invitation to all present to return often.

**Bishop's Congratulations**

His Excellency Bishop Boyle extended his congratulations to the clergy and the people of the parish who "by teamwork, courage and unanimity of purpose" made the Centre possible. He said it was an asset to the City and Province as it represented an investment in youth. He said of youth that there were two important factors — heredity and environment. Nothing could be done to change the former, but much could be done to aid and improve the latter. His Excellency added that the Centre could provide recreational facilities for youth and thus aid greatly in preventing juvenile delinquency.

However, he pointed out that lack of recreation does not cause juvenile delinquency, rather it was a breakdown in the Christian family. The building would also serve to aid in the teaching of civics on a local level and give youth a better insight into the basis of community life while at the same time cultivating in them a sense of responsibility.

Bishop Boyle warmly commended Premier J. Walter Jones for his support of Brotherhood Week which he said should bring a closer fellowship of mankind. He said that though the Communists professed to accept the Brotherhood of Man they had denied the Fatherhood of God.

**Warm Commendation**

His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse stated that the old hall had served the parish well but as it grew and prospered, a new and larger one was necessary. Complimenting the committee in charge, he said they might well be proud of the "magnificent" results they have attained.

Premier Jones said the Community Centre was "One of the very finest edifices in this town." He referred briefly to the leisurely referred to the lack of it in the country because farmers "cannot breed a 40-hour week cow". He said that play was nearly as important as work, especially for the young and this building would provide physical as well as mental relaxation.

He told the people of the parish that in the Community Centre they were "setting an example which will have to be followed elsewhere". The Premier said that this city was not a bad one. "There are no dope eaters here" and urged the people to follow the example of industry set by their past generations as a means of becoming first class citizens.

The Presbyterian officers were installed by the Rev. J. T. Irwin. Mrs. F. Cutcliffe assisted by Mrs. J. T. MacLeod opened the Question Box. The resulting open forum was enjoyed by all and many problems were shared and solved.

Mrs. Wilfred Craig, Middleton, chairman of the Resolution Committee presented the following resolutions:

Whereas it has been established that most alcoholics begin the drinking habit before the age of 20, and whereas the ignorance of our youth exposes them to grave peril; Resolved that we request the Dept. of Education to appoint a supervisor of alcohol education for the public schools and P. W. C.

2. Whereas the appalling indulgence in alcoholic beverages is more and more becoming a threat to the moral and economic stability of our Province, and whereas the late closing of liquor stores is a contributing factor; Resolved that we request the Temperance Commission to close all their stores at 6 o'clock on Saturdays.

3. Whereas much of the current reading material so easily available to our children is not only useless but harmful; be it resolved that we urge our auxiliaries to place the World Friends in our homes where there are children; and that we urge the reading of all good literature—also that we set as our goal a Missionary Monthly in every United Church home.

4. Whereas gambling is even more pervasive, even invading our retail stores and all forms of entertainment in the shape of door prizes. And whereas the moral wrong of gambling is that the reward is dependent on chance rather than a return for a service rendered and does become a source of moral breakdown for our children—youth as well as adults;

Resolved, That we put ourselves on record as being opposed to gambling in all forms and we urge our members to take no part in games of chance.

5. Whereas the new Canada Programs are difficult and impracticable, and the members prefer the Programs in the Missionary Monthly; Be it resolved that next year's Programs appear in the monthly.

6. Whereas many of our Presbyterial Secretaries have great difficulties in completing annual reports due to tardiness in submitting reports by our Auxiliaries, and whereas many of the secretaries in our Auxiliaries are not informed on the work they are required to carry on during the year; We would recommend and urge that the president of each Auxiliary or some other person qualified to do so, bring to the attention of her secretary the work required of her office as outlined in the Blue Book.

7. Be it resolved: That radio ministry be made available to the Protestant French Canadians, particularly in Ontario and Quebec under the guidance and support of the Home Mission Board of the United Church of Canada.

8. Be it resolved that this Presbyterial go on record as expressing sincere appreciation to the Ministers and the Official Board of Trinity United Church for the use of the church and hall; to the women of the congregation for their gracious hospitality; to Rev. Mr. Irwin for his inspiring address; to the organist and choir for leading the service of praise; to the sexton for making the building so comfortable, and to all who in any way helped to make our Presbyterial a time of fellowship and inspiration.

The report of the Credentials Committee was given by Miss Mabel Linkletter, Summerside, following which Presbyterial was declared closed to business.

In closing Mrs. H. Howard spoke a few words of Stewardship: "Take this thought to yourself: If everybody in the Auxiliary were the kind of Steward that I am, what kind of an Auxiliary would we have?"

**Christian Atmosphere**

Mayor J. D. Stewart in offering his congratulations on the beautiful edifice said that the original idea "built better than he knew". He called it a place where "youth can gather in a Christian atmosphere and under the leadership of their spiritual fathers" and added that in these troublous and trying days the need for such a place was a sharp one.

The Mayor also stated in the new building will meet many groups of adults filled with the wholesome desire to improve "not only their own circumstances and those of the Holy Redeemer parish, but those of our whole civic community taken in its best and broadest sense".

Mr. Charles Sinclair, president of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, briefly offered the congratulations of the Legion and said the Centre showed what a parish can do for a community.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness, said it was known that such a wonderful building was one of his weaknesses. He told the gathering that everyone who helped deserved a lot of credit and that as the years rolled by the people would realize how really fine a structure it is.

Rev. Dr. Patrick McMahon brought the best wishes of the worshippers at St. Dunstan's Basilica, and said the Centre was "a milestone in the march of progress of Holy Redeemer parish". He recalled the beginning of the parish 22 years ago and the task that faced the first rector. Since then he said each succeeding rector had added to the parochial structure. It was mainly, however, to the people of the parish that the credit belonged because "without their generosity little could have been accomplished".

**Former Rector Speaks**

An unexpected pleasure was given the huge gathering in the presence of the opening of Rev. Fr. Fleming, a former rector of the parish. He briefly reminisced about his years of service from 1933 to 1939 and recalled that even in those early parish days the people were of deep faith and deep interest in their homes and their community. He mentioned that the depression years offered little trouble in Holy Redeemer parish keeping his head above water as the people gave generously of their
