

MASONIC CEREMONY.

Laying the Corner Stone of the Methodist Church at Summerside.

Full Particulars of the Grand Event of To-day.

This is a grand day in Summerside. The town is thronged with people from all parts of the Province...

The ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new church was conducted according to the Masonic ritual.

- M. W. Grand Master—Thomas A. McLean. R. W. Deputy Grand Master—Wm Stewart. R. W. Senior Grand Warden—Duncan McLean.

About two o'clock the members of the fraternity lined up in front of the Market Hall and marched in procession through the principal streets to the site of the new church.

When the procession arrived at the site of the Church, the brethren opened to the right and left, and the Grand Master and his officers passed, through the lines thus made to the platform, and the brethren took up positions near by.

The Grand Secretary then read the letter of invitation, which is as follows:

SEMMERSIDE, P. E. I., July 11th, 1893. To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, officers and members of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of Prince Edward Island:

The Building Committee of the Methodist Church at Summerside humbly request your honorable grand body to lay with your usual ceremonies the corner stone of the new Methodist Church at this place on the 3rd Day of August, A. D. 1893.

It has been the custom among the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons from time immemorial to assemble for the purpose of laying the Foundation Stones of churches, public buildings and monuments when requested so to do by those in authority.

When addressing the brethren present, the Junior Grand Warden said:

"You have heard the order of the M. W. Grand Master of Masons, as communicated to me through the R. W. Senior Grand Warden. Of this you will take due notice and let it be accordingly so done."

The choir then sang the well-known Masonic hymn—"When the earth's foundation first was laid."

At the conclusion of which prayer was offered by the Grand Building Committee.

within the cavity beneath the foundation stone had been prepared.

The Grand Treasurer replied that the articles asked for were all ready.

The Grand Secretary then read the list of articles as follows:—Current coins. Copies of Wesleyan newspaper, Daily Guardian, Examiner, Patriot, Summerside Journal, and Pioneer.

A parchment roll on which was inscribed the following:—"Victoria," Queen of Great Britain, Ireland and British Dependencies, Empress of India.

Earl of Aberdeen, Governor General of Canada. Sir John Thompson, Premier of Canada and Minister of Justice.

Hon. J. S. Carvell, Lieutenant Governor of P. E. Island. Hon. F. Peters, Premier and Attorney General of P. E. Island.

Then amidst solemn music by the band the Grand Treasurer placed the box containing the documents referred to in position, and the foundation stone was slowly let down.

After the corner stone had been tested by the working tools of operative Masonry, the Grand Master said:

"This corner stone has been tested by the proper implements of Masonry. I find that the craftsmen have skillfully and faithfully performed their duty, and I do declare the stone to be well formed, true and true, and correctly laid, according to the rules of our ancient craft."

The elements of consecration, consisting of corn, wine and oil, were then presented, and each in turn was poured upon the stone by the Grand Master, who standing in front of all pronounced the following invocation:—

"May the all-bounteous Author of Nature bless the inhabitants of this place with an abundance of the necessities and comforts of life, assist in the erection and completion of this building, protect the workmen against every accident, long preserve the structure from decay; and grant to us all a supply of the Corn of nourishment, the Wine of refreshment, and the Oil of joy. Amen."

The Grand Marshal, under orders from the Grand Master, then made the following proclamation:—

"By order of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in the Province of Prince Edward Island, and in obedience to his order, I do now command and require all present here assembled to preserve silence and to observe due order and decorum during the ceremonies of this occasion. This proclamation I make once, twice, thrice, in the South, in the West and in the East."
