Financially Justified

After the announcement, Mr. MacNaught told The Guardian he was convinced that financial results would easily justify a double ferry service during the tourist season in future years.

"Greatest obstacle of our tourist season," Mr. MacNaught said, "has been the enforced wait between ferries. If a visitor to the Island missed one of the ferries, he was obliged to wait from three to four hours for the next one.

Truck Traffic Alleviated

Important as it is, Mr. MacNaught said, the tourist business is not the only reason for a double ferry service.

In his negotiations for the summer ferry shuttle service Mr. MacNaught said, he had the solid support of J. Lester Douglas, Liberal member for Queen's, J. T. Kieckham, Liberal member for Kings, and the three Prince Edward Island Senators.

Yesterday afternoon a telegram was received here by Mr. B. Graham Rogers from Mr. MacNaught, in reply to a day letter from Mr. Rogers, stating that negotiations for the double car ferry service had been completed.

Workers Union, to which most dockers belong, to expel members for their activities in a strike which crippled the port of London last summer.

The 1949 strike centred around two ships which the Canadian Seamen's Union had labelled "black."

The three expelled members, he said today, had refused to observe the rules and constitution of the T. G. W. U. and would not give undertakings about their future conduct.

The present stoppage is clearly Communist-inspired and is nothing less than an attack on the democratic and constitutional rules of the T. G. W. U., he said.

Winston Churchill, leader of the Conservative Opposition, expressed "on behalf of the whole House" support for the attitude Isaacs had taken.

But the unofficial port workers committee, which is directing the strike, proceeded with plans to gain support in other parts of the country.

Dominant figure in the committee is 47-year-old Albert Timothy. Among his closest associates are the three men expelled from the dock union—Bert Saunders, Harry Constable and Ted Dickens. Dickens is the only acknowledged Communist in the group.
