RECIPES FOR 6 SUCCOTASH CHOWDER 1 medium-size onion, peeled and thin-sliced 1 tsp. butter or margarine 1 tsp. water 1 (1 lb.) can red kidney beans 1 (1 lb.) can corn kernels, Mexican style 6 c. boiling water 2 envelopes vegetable broth powder 1/2 tsp. oregano 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt 2 tsp. minced parsley Steam-fry onion in butter or margarine with water in 3-qt. kettle. Add contents of the can of red kidney beans, contents of can of corn kernels, 6 c. boiling water, vegetable broth powder, oregano and seasoned salt. Bring to slow boil; simmer 10 min. Serve in soup plates or bowls. Garnish: minced parsley.
