CONTRACT BRIDGE

FAMOUS HANDS
Albert Benjamin, London star, writing in the (British) Bridge Magazine, tells about a little man he keeps running into.

He likes the man all right except for one annoying habit. It seems the little man shows Benjamin a hand, asks him what he bids, waits for the answer, and then disappears. Benjamin never discovers whether the answer is right or wrong.

For example, the little man asked Benjamin what he would do, sitting South, if West opened with two clubs, North passed, East bid two spades (East and West are both honest bidders), and South held ♠KJ74 ♥83

♠AKQ10952 ♣—
Benjamin mumbles that it is doubtful whether it is better to bid some quantity of diamonds, or whether it is better to pass and hope that North will lead a club against some high heart contract West might reach.

Of course, the little man promptly disappears after posing the question. Six months later Benjamin meets the little man again and asks what happened on the hand. The little man doesn't remember what happened. He doesn't even remember the hand.

Not only that, but the little man poses an even crazier problem. South reaches six spades doubled, West opens the three of hearts and it wins the trick! The defense is sound and declarer makes the contract. What are the four hands?

So Benjamin spends a few sleepless nights trying to figure out some reasonable hand that

meets the conditions staked out by the little man. Finally, he comes up with an answer that makes sense, but he can't find the little man to learn whether he's right. Here is the hand Benjamin composes:

East dealer.
East-West vulnerable.
NORTH:

The bidding:
East South West North
2♣ 2♦ 4♥ 4♠
5♦ Pass 5♥ 5♠
6♠ Pass 6♥ 6♠
Dblc.

Opening lead—three of hearts. Declarer ducks in dummy, fearing a ruff, and East discards a club. South, sensing the situation, discards the jack of diamonds. A heart is continued and the diamond king goes on the ace.

Declarer cashes the king and ace of spades, leads diamonds twice through East's A-Q, later discards four club losers on the established diamonds, and makes the slam!

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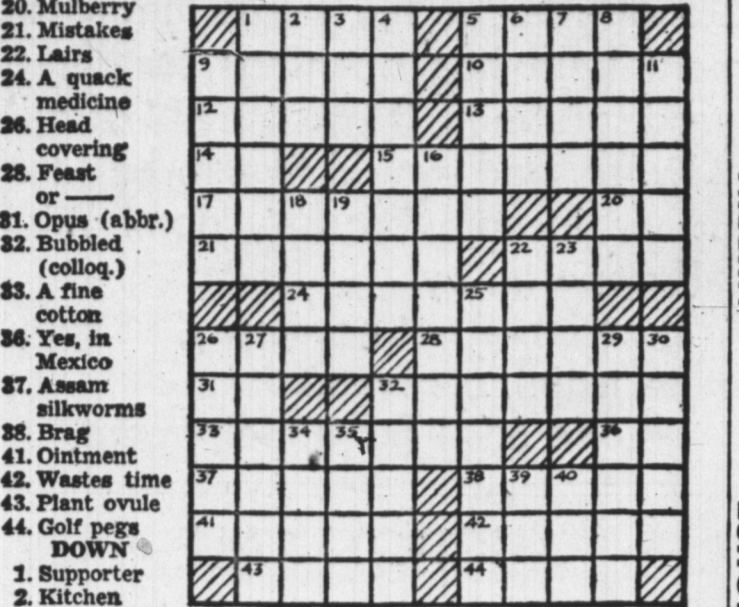

Radiation Study Asked By Canada

Canada moved in the U.N. today Thursday for a worldwide study on radiation and also stressed that the middle and smaller powers must be heard on the question of disarmament.

External Affairs Minister Howard Green, making Canada's policy speech to the 14th General Assembly, outlined his country's thoughts on radiation—a subject with implications reaching into the health of future generations—and said that disarmament must not be left to the great powers alone.

On radiation, the 64-year-old foreign minister said: "We believe that mankind would derive relief from anxiety if the nations of the world were to acknowledge an obligation to do what they can to ensure that the worldwide physical measurement of the intensity and distribution of radiation is made as accurate and complete as possible."

TO MAKE PROPOSAL
"At this session the Canadian delegation intends to submit a proposal which we sincerely hope will encourage the worldwide collection of more accurate data on radiation and will provide for its central collation."

Green told UN correspondents later complete plans haven't been worked out but "we don't think anybody is doing enough now" in this problem.

Ideally, he said, the full membership of the UN would funnel information on radiation to a central agency, where it would be made available to scientists of the world.

On disarmament—the dominant theme of the assembly—Green said Canada is "entirely sympathetic."

Riches Is Hope Of Salvagers

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Eight salvage men rode the rusty hulk of an abandoned ship down the Atlantic coast Friday in hopes the 400-foot stern section will be their key to riches.

They kept an anxious eye to the south where hurricane Gracie crept along. The storm was a possible threat to their hard work of the last six months.

The bulk is one section of the tanker African Queen, which was wrecked off Ocean City, Md., last December. The vessel struck a shoal and broke in two. The bow has since floated away. Owners of the vessel abandoned her.

"A Norfolk tug pulled the bulk along at a snail's pace, while the coast guard cutter Marion provided escort. The amateur salvagers staked out their claim to the vessel after professional salvagers wouldn't touch it.

They plan to bring the Queen 110 miles to Norfolk where they hope to sell her for about \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000. In persons interested in replacing her bow.

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
