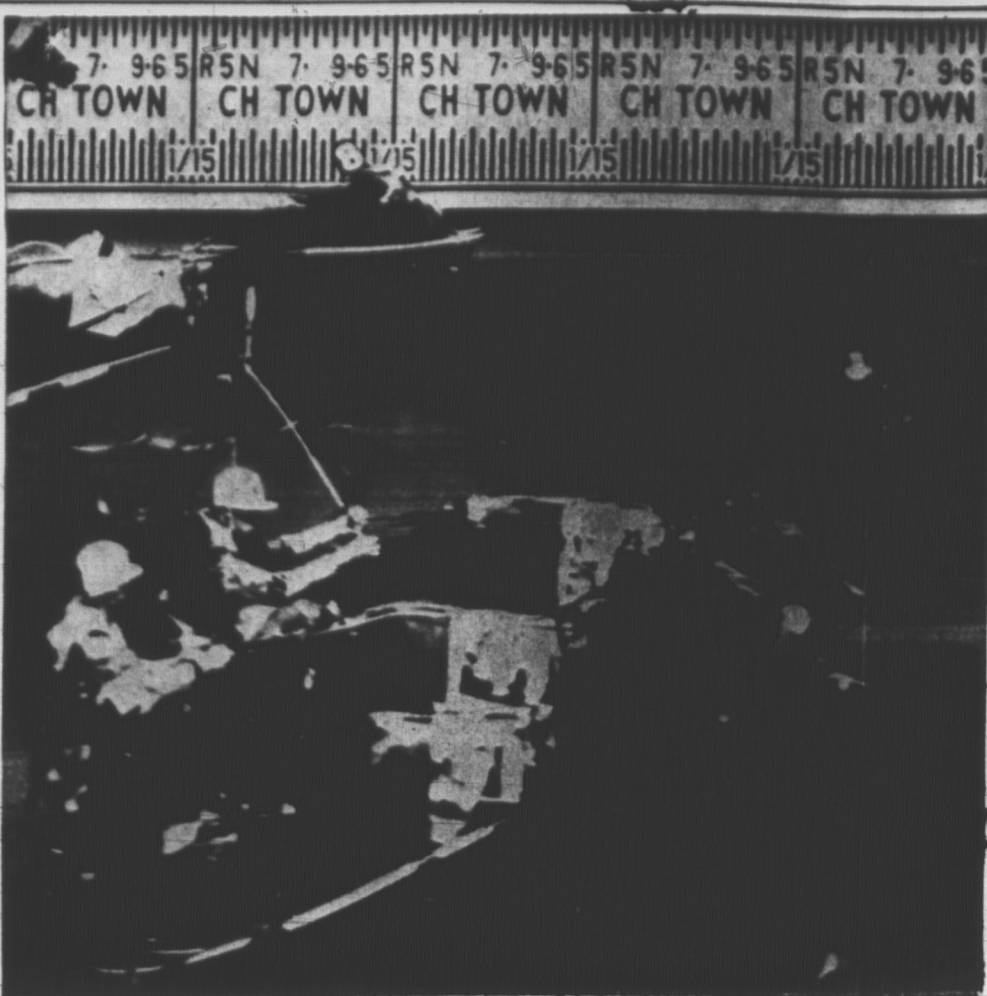

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP) - Defending champion Speedy Scot, with an imposing career record of 43 victories and two seconds in 54 starts, is the short-priced favorite to whip seven rivals from six countries in the 1 1/4 mile \$100,000 International trot at Roosevelt Raceway Saturday night.

The Castleton farm's barrel-chested five-year-old son of Speedster will meet an entirely new cast of foreign trotters as he attempts to match the record of Su Mac Lad which gave the United States two victories, in 1961 and 1963.

Jamin won for France two first years, 1959, and Harros II of The Netherlands scored in 1960. Canada's The Silk edged Su Mac Lad in 1962 but the popular gelding came back the following year with a stake record performance of 2:32 3/5. Speedy Scot matched that time last year.

The new collection this year in the 1 1/4 mile race will carry the banners of France, Italy, Sweden, New Zealand, Canada and, for the first time, England. Betsy Herbert, Canada's entry, qualified for the race by winning the Canadian championship two weeks ago. Observers said the six-year-old mare owned by Bill Herbert of London, Ont., should do well. The horse is a 6-to-1 second choice.

Peter Tompson Wins Fifth British Open Golf Ch'ship

SOUTHPORT, England (CP) Peter Tompson of Australia overcame wind and rain with two below-par final rounds of 71 and 72 to win his fifth British Open golf championship Friday with a 72-hole score of 285, seven under par.

Tomson, 35-year-old pro, shot below-par golf on three of his four rounds and was never too far off the pace after the opening round.

He won the title with his tremendous control despite the blustery weather that wrecked the cards of many of the stars including pre-tournament favorites Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer of the United States.

His first-round 74, one over par, put him six strokes off the pace but in the second round he shot a course-equalling 68 to

cut the lead of American defending champion Tony Lama and fellow Australian Bruce Devlin to two strokes.

In the final 36 holes, Tomson shaved three strokes-off par and that proved good enough to win one of golfdom's most cherished prizes.

Tomson won by two strokes over an Irishman and a Welshman as the highly-publicized U.S. contenders, led by Lama, could do no better than tie for fifth place.

Christy O'Connor of Ireland, 40-year-old Ryder Cup player, and Brian Huggett of Wales tied for second place with 287. O'Connor shot 69-73-74-71 and Huggett 73-69-76-70.

Playing with ice-calm efficiency in heightening tension, Tomson took the lead in the morning after 54 holes and held off the challenges of five pressing rivals in the afternoon's final 18.

Argentina's Roberto de Vicenzo was fourth with 288 on rounds of 74, 69, 73, 72. Lama shared fifth place with Britain's Bernard Hunt and Australia's Kel Nagle, the 1950 winner. Each had 289.

The massive U.S. challenge crumbled with only Lama and Nicklaus, who finished with a total of 294, in the first 15.

Palmer, who won the title in 1961 and 1962, wound up with a 295 total, 10 strokes behind Tomson.

The Melbourne pro, who openly detests the rich Ameri-

can tour, won his British Open in 1954, the year after Ben Hogan's triumph at Carnoustie, Scotland. He won three in a row, missed in 1957, and came back in 1958 to win again.

Tomson, whose victory was worth £1,750 (\$5,250) in cash and incalculably more in prestige, is the first player to win the championship five times since Britain's Harry Vardon won his fifth title in 1911. Vardon scored a record sixth victory in 1914, but competition then was not nearly as keen as it is now.

Veteran Shooter Susick Cops 2nd Day Aggregate

MP Mike Susick, veteran Bisleigh Marksman, shot steadily throughout the day yesterday and found himself at the head of the second days aggregate list when the results were compiled last evening. Susick placed fourth in the first day aggregate results.

The featured match of the day was the MacDonald Tobacco match which was won by G. E. Lawrence in a shoot-off with five other competitors who had tied

with identical scores of 118 out of 125. Mr. Lawrence hails from Sackville, N.B.

An out of province veteran of the P.E.I. competition C. C. Strong of Windsor, N.S. copped the Rogers Hardware match, racking up 49 out of 50 at 600 yards.

The Royal Canadian match was a real thriller. Both Eldon MacLean and DO Clark shot perfect 50s but in the following shootoff MacLean took the first prize.

In the day's final match four shooters tied with identical scores of 49 in the 10 round 200 yard Moore and McLeod match but young cadet Scott MacDonald could not be denied as he won the shoot off and first prize.

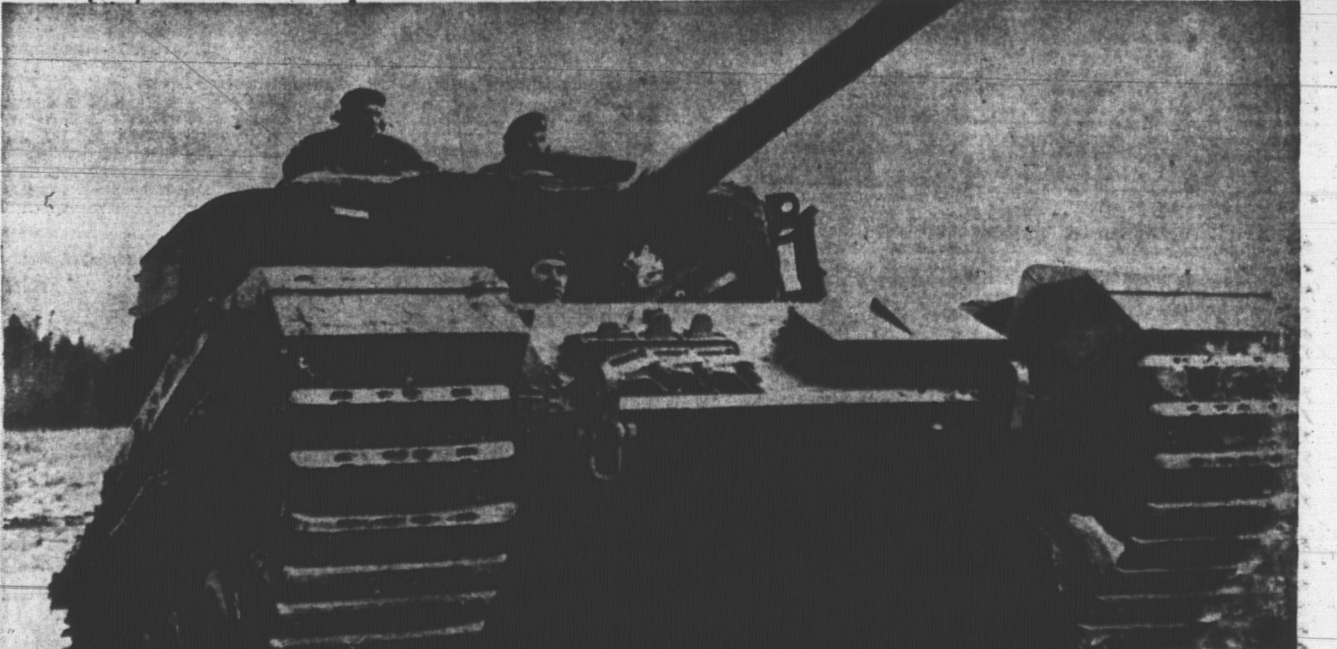
