OTTAWA, June 19 (CP)—Labor Minister Mitchell predicted confidently in the Commons tonight that Canada will experience a scarcity of workers by the end of July.

"This country was never richer than it is at this moment," he said. He could not, he went on, understand the "calamity howlers" who took a "saturnic delight" in predicting bad times.

Mr. Gillis had said, too, that there was unemployment in Nova Scotia mines, but, Mr. Mitchell contended, there were more men employed in the Nova Scotia mining industry than ever before.

As to a suggestion by Ross Thatcher (CCF—Moose Jaw) that the Dominion should contribute a "fair" share of direct relief in a depression, Mr. Mitchell said "bad money drives out good," and added without explanation: "I wouldn't invest a dollar in the Province of Saskatchewan at this time."

The veteran labor lawyer said, too, that some means should be devised to give workers a year-round income instead of having them prosperous at times and "starving" at others.

Woodworking Plant Destroyed By Fire

PICTOU LANDING, N. S., June 19 (CP)—A woodworking plant owned by Rene Abolt and Gordon Chisholm of this Pictou County town was burned today. Firemen from Trenton and New Glasgow helped keep the blaze from spreading to nearby buildings. The owners placed their loss at more than \$15,000.

Big-Time Gambler Faces Sentence Of 60 Years

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—Gambler Frank Erickson, an old hand at figuring the odds, today played a long shot that could bring him some degree of leniency. He was charged with conspiracy to defraud a bank of \$1,250,000. Erickson, 54-year-old gambler, admitted kingpin in a coast-to-coast, \$1,250,000-a-year betting business, stood tensely beside the defence table in special sessions court as Judge Nathan B. Perlman asked: "Does the defendant plead guilty to each of the 60 counts?" "Yes," Erickson said firmly. District Attorney Frank Hogan said the evidence against Erickson was "so overwhelming that a guilty plea was his only alternative. The plea, Hogan said, spells the end "for all time to come" of the gambling activity of a man he called "the biggest and most notorious bookmaker in the United States."

Navy Gets Green Light To Try Atomic Sub

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—President Truman today was reported ready to ask Congress for \$300,000,000 to speed development of the super-powerful hydrogen bomb.

It was a secret, however, whether the money would be used for actual construction of the world's first H-bomb—heralded as perhaps 1,000 times more powerful than the original atom bomb—or for expanded research.

Truman gave the momentous order last January for the Atomic Energy Commission to go ahead with attempted development of the new weapon. At that time, estimates ranged from \$100,000,000 to \$4,000,000,000 as the possible cost.

Grade A Egg Prices Advance

OTTAWA, June 19 (CP)—A scarcity in marketings of grade "A" eggs was reported today by the Agriculture Department.

As a result of this marketing scarcity, domestic prices are advancing, said the department, and movement into storage "appears about over."

Death In N. S. Of Well-Known Man

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., June 19 (CP)—Patrick O'Rourke, 68, who during his career as wire chief with the Canadian Pacific Telegraphs worked in Fredericton, Moncton and Saint John, in New Brunswick, died here today. He had been in hospital for two weeks following a heart attack.

Nowlan Regains Former Seat In Annapolis-Kings

(By The Canadian Press) Three Federal by-elections yesterday sent two Liberals and one Progressive Conservative to the House of Commons.

In Halifax and Montreal Carlier the Liberals retained the seats they held before the by-elections were called. Samuel Balcom won the vacant seat in the du-du Halifax constituency and Leon D. Crohn won for the Liberals in Montreal Carlier.

Captured Old Seat

In Annapolis-Kings, in Nova Scotia's apple belt, George Nowlan captured the seat he held before the 1949 general election. He won over Angus Elderkin, Liberal, who was returned in 1949 by five votes but the election subsequently was voided.

OTTAWA, June 19 (CP)—Canadians have gone on a home building spree which has sent housing loans climbing despite a current temporary lumber shortage.

New Species Of Cutworm Causing Heavy Damage In Many Grain Fields

A ravaging army of cutworms aided by the dry, hot June weather is rapidly destroying grain crops in the Eastern section of Quebec and Kings counties with the infestations appearing to range from Alexandria to Jona and from French Fort to Souris.

The attacks, first noticed less than two weeks ago in scattered sections have increased to alarming proportions. The pests have laid waste to a 50 acres grain crop on the Union Road and to another 50 acres in the Fortune area.

Disturbing Feature

One of the disturbing features of the attacks is that the cutworms appear to be an entirely new species first discovered in the province last year in a small number. The species can not be identified in laboratories in Ottawa at present and the scientists will probably have to wait until the cutworm reaches the adult stage before it can be identified.

Quiet Campaigns

Balloting climaxed a quiet campaign with the contests attracting little outside interest. Nine candidates ran for the three seats formerly held by Liberals.

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Try New Chemicals

This morning several men from the Entomological Lab. will be trying new chemicals to determine the most effective method in combating the cutworms. The experiments will be conducted in Mr. MacKinnon's cutworm infested field in the Ugg area. Each chemical will be tried on a small square of grain.

Mr. Cannon states that the poison branbaal composed of 22 pounds of bran, one pound of paris green and two and one half gallons of water, is all right for small areas. It was believed, however, that three percent DDT dust was more effective, he stated.

Some Reseeding Fields

Some farmers are busy reseedling their grain crops, but Mr. Cannon states that such undertakings are useless unless the cutworms have been destroyed for they will only eat off the grain when it comes up again.
