Shocks of earthquake continue in West Hungary.

It is said that Gambetta's cook receives 1077f per month.

On the 18th inst. snow fell to the depth of six inches on the streets of Vienna.

Russia has reduced her force of sailors on the Black Sea to nearly a thousand men.

It is stated that Sir Garnet Wolseley will shortly receive the decoration of the Grand Cross of the Bath.

MR. MUNZ, M. P., proposes to stop the sale of wines and liquors in the English House of Commons.

WILLIAM WELSH, Esq., of the firm of Welsh & Owen, returned from England last evening.

REGULAR convocation of Port la Joie Encompt will be held at Odd Fellows' Hall this evening at 8 o'clock.

EXTRAORDINARILY hot weather (for the time of year) prevails in the Northern and Western States and in Ontario and Quebec.

The schooner "Maria Elinore," of Quebec, was lost at the Magdalen Islands on the 8th inst. The crew was saved.

The *Moncton Times* says as things look now we may hope to see the building of the Peters' Combination Lock Co. erected before winter.

SEVERAL Americans are at Lake Anislie, N. S., making preparations for boring for oil. A large amount of machinery has arrived there.

The steamer "Worcester," Hedge, arrived from Boston at 6.30 this morning, with freight and the following passengers: Mr. S. Wilmot, Miss Julia LePage, Mr. John Peterson, Miss Catherine Finlayson.

A ST. PETERSBURG correspondent says that he learns from a trustworthy source that England has informed Russia that British influence must dominate in Afghanistan's foreign relations.

THE Domestic Monthly published by Blake & Co. 349 Broadway, New York, is again at hand. It gives the ladies the latest fashions and a large amount of other information and good literature.

THE members of St. Lawrence Lodge, No. 3, I. O. O. F., of this city, have been active during the past two weeks in having their Lodge Room beautified. It now presents a very pleasing appearance, not surpassed in the city.

T. WILSON BELL, of Dorchester, was found drowned in a well in the cellar of his own house, on the 20th inst. It seems that he went to the well to get a pail of water and, in reaching down to dip it up, he lost his balance and fell in.

IN THE STORM of Monday night last the schooner *Merry Charles* was struck by a squall off Cariboo Light and turned bottom up. The crew, seven in number, were all lost. The bodies of two of the unfortunate seamen were washed ashore yesterday morning.

INTELLIGENCE has been received from Massowah that the mission of Gordon Pasha to the King of Abyssinia has been successful. The King renounces his claims to Massowah, but he will be allowed to choose a more southerly point of communication with the sea.

By telegram to Hon. L. C. Owen, Oct. 21st: the barque "Lucy Pope," Peter Marchison, Master, sailed from Liverpool for Baltimore; barque "Plevna," McPherson, Master, sailed from Liverpool for Baltimore, and the barque "William Owen," Brown, Master, sailed from Baltimore for Rouen.

MR. ARCHIBALD FORBES' Zulu lectures have naturally excited intense interest in France, and he has been asked, and has agreed, to give them to a Paris audience. The English, or Anglo-American, colony in Paris can furnish forth a goodly audience array, but doubtless many Parisians will go who may understand but little of the lecture.

Up to the year 1865 Russia possessed 8,000 elementary public schools, with 280,000 pupils. That number has now increased to 24,000 (inclusive of municipal schools) with nearly 1,000,000 children, but the number of children between the ages of seven and thirteen is about 12,000,000, so that upwards of 90 per cent of Russian children remain uneducated.

AMEER YAKOUB KHAN has announced his determination to abdicate, and states that he intended to abdicate earlier, but was dissuaded. General Roberts has advised the Ameer to reconsider the matter, but the Ameer firmly adheres to his resolution. Gen. Roberts is, in consequence, making arrangements for maintaining order in Afghanistan and carrying on the administration.

A new fish, which is like a "shad of the herring species," has been observed during the last two years in the waters of Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence. Shoals of them are said to have appeared at Chippewa Bay. They are good articles of food, and from six to eight inches long. In some parts of the river, on the Canadian side, according to the *Ogdensburg Journal*, they were taken out by the barrel. They are also found in quantities in winter when a hole is cut in the ice. The appearance of this fish in such numbers and in such a place is strange, but possibly some of our naturalists will be able to account for the fact.

FEARFUL PRONOSTICATION.—The following, from "The Sanitarian," has been sent us for insertion: "The conjunction at perihelion of the four great planets—Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune—occurs in 1880, for the first time since the opening of the Christian Era. It is predicted that this event will be attended by dire and dreadful disturbances of the atmosphere of this planet. Extreme vicissitudes of weather, deluges followed by droughts, causing the failure of crops, famine, pestilence. The vitality of every living thing on the surface of the earth will be tested to the utmost. The theory is that from 1880 to 1885 there is to be a general and prolonged period of pestilence and woe."
