Old Veteran Bill Gadsby To Coach Detroit Squad

TORONTO (CP) — The Globe and Mail says Bill Gadsby, veteran defenceman with Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League, will coach Detroit next season.

Gadsby, retiring from active playing after 20 seasons in the NHL with Chicago Black Hawks, New York Rangers and the Wings, met with Detroit owner Bruce Norris Thursday night after the team was defeated by Montreal Canadiens in the Stanley Cup final.

The Habs defeated the Wings 2-2 in overtime to win the series 4-2. Gadsby, 38-year-old native of Calgary now in the insurance business in Edmonton, is scheduled to meet with Norris again within two weeks to sign a contract as coach, the newspaper says.

Gadsby said Thursday he is interested in coaching only the Red Wings, not a minor league club. Sid Abel, currently serving as both coach and general manager of the Wings, will devote his full time to managing duties.

Gadsby has been part of Detroit's unique coaching system for several seasons in which Abel appointed Gadsby, Gordie Howe, Alex Delvecchio and Marcel Pronovost, who was traded last summer to Toronto Maple Leafs, as assistant coaches.

All Owners Are Confident On Eve Of Kentucky Race

By ORLO ROBERTSON. LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The field for today's Kentucky Derby was reduced to 15 with announcement that Sean E. Indian will not run in the classic for three-year-olds. At the same time Exhibitionist went on the hospital list Friday with an injured nose and was listed by trainer Hirsch Jacobs as a doubtful starter in the 1 1/2-mile run.

The withdrawal of Sean E. Indian was announced by Mary D. Keim, owner and trainer. "The filling did not go out of his leg after he hit himself Thursday," she said. "He will be okay in about two or three days, but he just can't be ready for the Derby."

The race is set for 5:30 p.m. EDT. With the scratching of Sean E. Indian, trainer Jim Padgett announced that Louisiana Derby winner Blue Skyer will be ridden by Earle Fires, who lost his mount when Mrs. Keim's horse was withdrawn.

HAVE SAME SIRE. Both Sean E. Indian and Exhibitionist were sired by Promised Land. The colt, who like Exhibitionist was sired by Promised

Land, was entered at the cost of \$500. If Exhibitionist and Sean E. Indian do not go, there'll be 14 starters. The field was robbed of much of its class due to injuries suffered by the two leading two-year-olds of 1965, Graustark and Buckpasser, plus highly regarded Saber Mountain, and the failure of last year's Horse of the Year, the two-year-old filly Moccasin to train for the Derby.

With 14 starters the gross value of the race will be \$162,000 with \$119,500 to the winner. The purse carries \$25,000 for second, \$12,500 for third and \$5,000 for fourth.

With the prospects of temperatures in the 70s, the usual crowd of 100,000 will pack the Downs' ancient stands and spew over into the infield. CBS will televise the race from 5 to 6 p.m. EDT with radio broadcasts scheduled for 5:15 to 5:45 p.m. EDT.

Abe's Hope, a relaxed little animal, remained the lukewarm choice but there seemed to be support mounting for Kauai King, whose six victories and one second in eight starts this year is the best performance of the year of any of the starters.

IS CONFIDENT. Del Carroll, polo playing trainer of Abe's Hope, said the horse is at the top of his condition. Abe's Hope, who'll be ridden by three-time Derby winner Bill Shoemaker, is owned by the Grand Prix Stable of John Bartell and Robert Byfield.

Kauai King, carrying the hopes of Michael Ford of Omaha, Neb., with Don Brumfield in the saddle, blew out three-eighths of a mile in 33.25 seconds and continued out a half-mile in 50 seconds.

Tired Habs Team Arrives At Home

MONTREAL (CP) — A tired but triumphant team of Montreal Canadiens arrived home Friday to a brief heroes' welcome at a downtown railway station.

The players were tired after their sixth-game victory over Detroit Red Wings in the Stanley Cup final and the big celebrations that go with a triumph in the National Hockey League classic.

Most filed directly past the 100 reporters and 500 fans waiting to greet them at Central Station.

The train bringing the team from Detroit arrived in Montreal 1 1/2 hours late. Her player-husband finished a rather so-so season with a late playoff flourish.

GREETED BY CHEER. Team captain Jean Beliveau was greeted with the traditional team shout of "Les Canadiens sont la!" (The Canadiens are in!) as he stepped from the train.

More cheers followed as goalie Lorne Worsley and forward Henri Richard appeared. Richard scored the winning overtime goal in Canadiens' 3-2 victory over the Wings, which gave them the series four games to two.
