It tells the old, old story how Pilate tried to save Jesus, but finally allowed Him to be led away to Calvary. All the cast were especially well suited to his or her parts. The two chief parts were Pilate, played by Mr. Harry MacWilliam and Proculla, Pilate's wife, taken by Mrs. Thomas Phillips. Other main supporting parts were cleverly acted out by Mrs. Marne Kennedy as Herodias, Herod's wife, and George Stewart as Herod. Another important part was "Miriam" who was enacted by Miss Evelyn Gay, whose acting was superb and her wonderful voice was heard to advantage in several sacred numbers. The singing was all of a very high order. A solo by Mr. Lester Gay was greatly enjoyed, also solos by Mrs. H. M. Burgess and Miss Evelyn Gay. A trio composed of Messrs J. M. MacWilliam, Alvin Webb and Leslie MacAulay and duets by Mrs. John Moreshead and Mrs. Lewis Bernard, also by Misses Lorraine MacNeill and Evelyn Gay, who were all heard to advantage in sacred selections.

All the characters were in appropriate costumes pertaining to the time of Jesus and were very effective and most realistic, and much credit is due Mrs. L. G. Dewar who capably supervised this important item. The young ladies attendants were all dressed in long beautiful evening gowns and looked the picture of girlish loveliness. The soldiers and their commanders, dressed in the traditional armor of the period, looked very realistic and ready for any military emergency as did the centurion, Pretonius.

A very life-like tomb was erected in the front of the church, constructed by Messrs. Lewis Bernard and Burton Boates. The Resurrection garden was splendidly portrayed by Easter lilies, ferns, plants, green boughs and a real palm tree, kindly donated by Mr. A. J. Matheson. Beautiful colored lights added much to the effectiveness and a beautiful lighted cross coming on at the Resurrection morning was most impressive. "Mary" was acted by Miss Shirley Gorrill and also the Resurrection angel, Miss Hester Boates, was also tenderly and reverently portrayed. In fact all the members of the cast were splendidly suited to their parts and gave creditable performances.

Inspector Merritt Callaghan of Alberton writing in the "Report of the Department of Education for P. E. I." has the following interesting comments on the School Properties and Improvements in his inspectorate, which includes O'Leary and the schools adjacent to it: "During the past two years 66 of the 83 school districts in this Inspectorate have taken advantage of the Government Grant for improvements in school properties. New schools were constructed at O'Leary, Northam and Waterford last year; Cape Wolfe and Springfield West this year, making a total of ten classrooms. Construction has started on new schools at Haliburton and a new school was opened at Mill River East. It is probable that work will be started this fall on new schools in Emsdale and Birch Hill. The following schools are worthy of being mentioned for extensive improvements made during the past two years: Knutsford, Milburn, South West, Mount Royal, Glenarry, Belmont, Hebron, Arlington, Unionvale and Milo. If the Government grant is available for another three years that is a rate of improvement continues, I venture to say that at the end of that time, practically every district in this inspectorate will have modern and up-to-date classrooms with suitable equipment for the use of teacher and pupil.
