Pearson Sees Jobless Climb

By ARCH MacKENZIE WALKERTON, Ont. (CP) — Estimates of unemployment, said prepared for a government inquiry into the unemployment insurance fund and indicating 535,000 jobless persons in 1964, were made public here by Liberal Leader Lester Pearson.

He called the figures the "main table of estimates" prepared for a committee of inquiry established in 1961 and headed by President E. C. Gill of the Canadian Life Assurance Company. The committee report has not been made public.

The estimate is that in 1964 unemployment will hit a peak of 535,000. Mr. Pearson said, "That's the average through the year. It means in the worst month a peak—a peak in the winter after next—of 750,000 Canadian men and women out of work. "And the government's campaign is that the country is doing fine, that if it can stay in office everything will be wonderful." Rebel Group Of Doctors Propose Health Program

By JACK BEST TORONTO (CP) — A rebel group of doctors have proposed a national health insurance program that in many fundamental respects was radically different from that advocated by the Canadian Medical Association.

They said their basic position was supported by 50 physicians and surgeons throughout Canada, who had endorsed the principle of the plan as outlined in circulars sent out from Toronto. Ten doctors in the Toronto area formed the "nucleus" of the movement.
