

Chairman Is Appointed By Minister Of Labor

J. Elmer Blanchard, minister of labor, announced yesterday that Rev. Malcolm McQuig, minister of the Kirk of St. James, has accepted the appointment of chairman of the newly organized Provincial Labor Management Council. This completes the organization of the council.

The six-member council, composed of three members from management and three from labor has already held several meetings and the selection of the new chairman was one of its major activities.

Mr. Blanchard says that he is highly encouraged by the interest being shown in the new Council by the members. He said this morning, "It is my feeling that this Council will fill a great need in that it will help to close a serious communications gap that exists between management and labor." He further said that he believes that once machinery exists for both groups to talk together on a regular basis rather than only on a basis of crisis that many problems will be smoothed out.

In defining the purpose of the Council, the Minister said: "This new group is an independent study group. It will serve as a forum for the discussion of labor management problems. It will be able to study existing labor legislation and make suggestions for new legislation. It will also have an opportunity to observe and study what other parts of Canada are doing to meet labor-management problems. It will be able to recommend and carry out educational and informational programs of a wide variety."

Mr. Blanchard listed the following as members of the Council: F. W. Curtis, William Shields, Norman Stewart, and Raymond MacDonald, all of Charlottetown; Everett MacLeod of Borden and Dennis Thibodeau of Georgetown.

SUMMERSIDE — A follow-up to the social problems seminar in September has gone on record as being in favor of forming a group.

The motion came out of a meeting of the board of directors of the seminar and chairman and vice-chairman of syndicate groups at the K & C center here Wednesday night.

Rev. Robert Tuck moved that the meeting decide to form a group, choosing a steering committee which would attempt to draw up suggestions or guidelines for it, then to be submitted to another meeting for modification and approval.

A steering committee of five members was set up. Members are Gordon Montford, Henry Wedge, Lorne Murphy, Rev. Mr. Tuck, all of Summerside; and Euclid Arsenault of Wellington.

The steering committee are to come up with a guideline for the Prince County development group by the January 11, 1967, meeting, and are to report at that time to the board of directors and committee chairman.

Ellerslie Legion Attend Service

Ellerslie Legion members, comprising the districts from Grand River to Portage, attended St. Anne's Church Lennox Island on Sunday, Nov. 6 in a body for service at 10.30 a.m. They marched from Lennox Island wharf to the church.

Wreaths were laid in the church by the past-president, Bud Williams, and there was a two-minute silence at 11 a.m.

During the service, Rev. E.W. MacInnis gave the following address: "Annually on Remembrance Day we wend our way to the graves of our fallen heroes there to do them honour. This is a good and a patriotic duty. Neither neglect nor the passing of time can cause us to forget the cost of a free country."

"On Remembrance Day, we go to the tombs of our fallen heroes with garlands of gratitude; we march in memory of the ones who march no more; we raise and lower the flag for which they died; we praise in song and speech their sacrifice; we try in every way to honor and remember those who died for our country, who died for you and me, who made the supreme sacrifice."

"Remembrance Day means much. Once our fallen heroes were strong, healthy, young, full of vigor, buoyant with hope, resolution for discussion and decision.

The resolutions committee will meet again before the convention to decide on a debating time limit for the resolutions.

FAVOR DEFENCE REVIEW

A resolution on defence says that until there is a full review of defence policy by a Commons committee the navy, army and air force should be retained as distinct services with distinct identities.

It also recommended that further development of training command be halted and that responsibility for training of soldiers, sailors and airmen be returned to the individual services.

On federal-provincial affairs, a draft resolution says basic cultural facilities should be made available to all Canadians in both languages.

A resolution on housing recommends that the interest part of monthly mortgage payments by owner-occupied homes be deductible for income tax purposes.

Field Representative Addresses Credit Union

SUMMERSIDE — "Economic democracy as attained by applying the principles of political democracy to the operation of our economic institutions. The Credit Union is a sterling example of democracy in action. It is more than that — it is the expression in the field of economics of a high social ideal."

These were the words expressed by J. Elmer Hynes, Agricultural Economist and Field Representative for the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League.

He was addressing the officers and committee members of the Summerside RCAF Credit Union, at a dinner meeting held Thursday evening at the Tartan Restaurant in Summerside.

Summerside RCAF Credit Union is the largest of the Island's 36 Credit Unions. Organized only five years ago, it has experienced amazingly rapid growth, and currently shows assets of over \$700,000 with a total membership of over 1150. Mr. Hynes informed the meeting. It has a full time staff of three, he added. However, much of the work, including policy making, is done free of charge by the credit union officers and committee members. He added that these people accept their responsibilities because of a desire to build their credit union, in the knowledge that by so doing they help to make the Canadian Forces Base at Summerside a better place in which to live, both for themselves and for their fellow airmen.

The meeting concluded with a short discussion on "operation Green Light" with a background of a large sign artistically constructed by people at C.F.B. Operation Green Light was explained by Mr. Hynes as an Educational program being conducted by the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League on behalf of the 36 Credit Unions and their members on P.E.I.
