QUEBEC, Dec. 6.—It is stated, on good
authority, that Bishop Gravel, of Nicolet, has
received instructions from Rome forbidding
his clergy from taking part in the coming
federal election for Nicolet, and that he has
accordingly addressed a circular to all the
parish priests of that county notifying them
to that effect.

morning last, the customs office was dis-

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—Postmaster-General
Mulock authorized your correspondent
tonight to make an announcement which
will bring joy to the heart of the enterpris-
ing advertiser and give satisfaction to the
public generally. It is that he is about to
remove the restriction which at present
prevents the user of a postal card from
utilizing the front of a post-card by having
anything written or printed on it except
the address of the person for whom it is
intended. Mr. Mulock's intention is to
permit pictures, views, designs, or other
advertising matter to be printed on the
face of the card, so long as sufficient
clear space is left to allow of the address
being written or printed, so that it can be
easily read in the office where it is posted.
The face of the card may be converted
into a work of art without impairing its
usefulness, and advertisers will no doubt
avail themselves of the privilege. The
cards will be issued in sheets if so desired
for convenience in printing. Mr. Mulock
thinks that this concession will prove a
considerable stimulant to business, and
will not only advertise the advertiser, but
the country as well, and also add consider-
ably to the postal revenue. It will also
furnish work for printers and lithograph-
ers. The idea is certainly a capital one
and may result in much good to the
country in the way of advertising some of
its natural features, as well as its public
and other buildings.

panies of marines, numbering 20 officers
and 1,200 men, and a company of naval
artillery numbering 200 men, arrived at
Kiao-Chau Bay, for which point, as
already cabled, they will soon set out, they
will bring the total German force there up
to 4,560 men, the largest body Germany
has ever sent beyond the European waters.
It is expected that the reserves will have
to be drawn upon. The admiralty denies
that other European squadrons have
entered the harbor at Kiao Chau to watch
Germany's proceedings, and it is believed
that Admiral Von Diederich would protest
vigorously against such an attempt.

LONDON, December 5.—The Belgian
government has asked the assistance of
Scotland Yard, and the same request will
be sent to New York police in tracing the
manufacture of forged hand-made franc
notes of the National Bank of Belgium. The
forgeries are splendidly executed and it is
almost certain are not of Belgian man-
ufacture. They are in circulation all over
Europe and considerable anxiety prevails
as to the number actually made. As far
as is known, all the spurious notes bear
date of January 23, 1897.

LONDON, December 5.—English politics
are sagacious as a mill pond without a
ripple. The leaders have lost their breath
and rumor mongers their cunning. The most
troublesome feature of their ministerial
programme at the coming session will be
the London section. Lord Salisbury seems
bent upon following up his attack upon
the county council. It is now believed that
the government will support bills for the
incorporation of Kensington and Westmin-
ster as cities independent of the county
council, except with respect to sanitary
building regulations. This will lead to a
struggle at the March elections.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., December 5.—The
steamer City of Tokio, arrived yesterday
from Yokohama and Hong Kong, bringing
the following advices:

"The recent ministerial crisis in Japan
resulted in Count Okuma being relieved of
his post of minister of foreign affairs and
the appointment of Baron Nishi Toku-
Baro, a member of the privy council
formerly minister of Russia. Marquis
Hachisunah, minister of education, was
appointed member of the privy council,
and Mr. Hama Arato, president of the
imperial privy council, received the por-
tfolio for the department of education,
while Baron Yamada Nobumichi, governor
of Kyoto, was appointed minister of the
agricultural and commercial department
rendered vacant by the resignation of Count
Okuma."

ROME, Dec. 4.—Torrential storms have
prevailed for three days over large parts
of Italy. In the Bay of Naples 25 merchant-
men have been wrecked, though there has
been no loss of life, and several houses on
the sea front have collapsed. Considerable
damage has been done here and in the
district around the city. Almost all parts
of Italy have suffered in a measure and
railway communication has been seriously
interrupted. The harbor of Portici, on
the Bay of Naples has been greatly damaged
and it is feared that there have been some
fatalities there.

MADRID, Dec. 5.—El L beral, the official
organ, contends today that there is no good
ground to fear that the United States will
recognize the insurgents as belligerents or
otherwise interfere in the settlement of
the Cuban difficulty "inasmuch as Spain
as Spain has accorded her colonies in the
Antilles the maximum of liberty that other
powers accord their colonies. Therefore
the United States ought to be grateful to
Spain. But if America's good will is
hampered by offensive or restrictive con-
ditions, we must ignore them and act in
accordance with our interests, our honor
and sovereignty."

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—On Thanksgiving
evening Samuel J. Parkhill, 74 years of
age, of Brooklyn, married Miss Annie
Kirkland, also of Brooklyn, who was 50
years his junior. Today Parkhill com-
mitted suicide at his home in Brooklyn
by shooting through the brain with a revolver.
When they were married the families of
both parties objected strongly on account
of the disparity in the ages. The couple
were forced to separate and since that time
Parkhill had appeared somewhat depre-
ssed. He lived with his married daughter
and his son, and when the family were at
church today he shot himself in his room.
His relatives give no reason for the
suicide.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Both the British ad-
miralty and the war department are test-
ing, under various climatic conditions, the
new method of conserving flour. One
objection to the establishment of natural
granaries has been the difficulty of storing
wheat for any length of time. The grain
germinates and is ruined, and to keep vast
quantities in a sound condition has been
pronounced by the royal commission im-
practicable. Experiments are being made
with a system of compressing into bricks
by hydraulic pressure. The trials show
that flour, so treated, is not affected by
damp, even under unfavorable conditions
is free from mould, and is sweet and
wholesome. Moreover compression de-
stroys all forms of larval life, and flour is
thereby rendered safe from the attacks of
insects. The saving in storage is enormous,
as the cubic space occupied by 100
pounds of loose flour will hold more than
300 pounds of the compressed article.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The Prince line
steamer Trojan Prince, which arrived
today from Leghorn, Genoa and Naples,
brought from the latter port 1,008 steer-
age passengers, the greater portion of them
being women and children. This is the
largest number of Italian immigrants
brought by any one steamer to this port in
months.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Vienna correspon-
dent of the Daily Mail describes a sensa-
tion involving the Comtesse Eugenie,
daughter of the wealthy Comte Cerchi,
who eloped some time ago with a Serbian
named Chevitch, supposed by her to be
