

# Juniors Nip Eagles; Tie Combines For 3rd

**SUMMERSIDE** — Having reached the half way mark of the schedule, the last place Summerside Junior Legionnaires are making their upward move in the Prince County Hockey League.

Sunday, the Legionnaires blew an early three goal lead but held on to dump the RCAF Eagles in an exciting fast, free wheeling match. Only four minor penalties were called. Both goalies Gary Sommers of the Juniors and the Eagles' Jerry Campbell were tested frequently.

For the Juniors it was their second straight win and the first over the Eagles this year. More significant is the fact that the Legionnaires are now tied with the Enman Drug Combines, each having eight points.

Unsung Junior forward, Paul MacWilliams won the game at 14:24 of a fast final period with a line drive slap shot. MacWilliams also set up two other markers. Linemate Billy MacMillan scored two of the Legionnaires goals.

MacMillan batted in his second goal after picking up MacWilliams' rebound drive to give the Juniors a 4-1 lead in the second frame. The Eagles, noted for their comeback then tallied three successive times to tie the game. Ray Prang scored in front of the net, setting up the play. Tony Licari tallied from in front of the net and Gerry Bernard's pass set up George Buffett with the tying score at 18:57.

The Eagles exerted pressure throughout the period getting a lot of shots in on Souris.

Leafs had lost three games and tied one in their last four and their position wasn't helped by the loss of Andy Bathgate out with a broken thumb, and Ron Ellis, sidelined after receiving a hard check in Boston Friday. He will be out for at least a week.

Imlach brought Bert Selby from the Junior A Toronto Marlboros to replace Ellis. He played with Dave Keon and George Armstrong Saturday.

"We're the world's champions," Imlach said. "And we're still champions until we lose that final game."

"We can't afford to start thinking like losers."

Jim Pappin, who had three consecutive breakaways but failed to score said: "You can't describe those things. It's just the way you play it. On one of them I was going to shoot, but changed my mind."

Detroit goaltender Roger Crozier was injured late in the game when a stick struck him in the eye. The accident occurred on a shot from behind the Detroit net, Crozier said. As the puck crossed in front of the net, a stick, apparently intended to deflect the puck, hit him.

Substitute goalie Carl Wetzel finished the game.

After Leafs' scored their second goal in the second period, defenceman Carl Brewer was seen at the bench yelling at Crozier. He said later he was yelling "ten" recalling Leafs' win over Detroit earlier in the season.

"I was just seeing how good his memory was," Brewer said.

# Canada Finally Wins; Whips Czechoslovakia

**WINNIPEG (CP)**—Canada defeated Czechoslovakia 4-3 Sunday before 7,000 fans for its first exhibition hockey victory in eight games against two of Europe's top clubs.

Last week Canada tied the Czechs 3-3 in an international tournament at Colorado Springs, Colo. to halt a losing streak of six games, five to Russia's national team.

Canada beat the Czechs with hard skating, sharp passing and a solid defence, facets in their play which have improved immensely since they started the international matches with a 4-0 loss to Russia three weeks ago.

The Czechs, who beat Russia 5-3 in the Walter Brown Memorial tournament at Colorado Springs, lacked the precision passing and quick reactions that carried Russia to its victories over Canada.

Grant Moore, a member of the 1964 Canadian junior champion Toronto Marlboros, Aggie Kuchowicz, Gary Begg and Al Johnson scored for Canada, which held period-leads of 2-0 and 3-0.

## BOBBY HULL SCORES 32ND

# Canadiens, Wings Win; Toronto Ties Rangers 3-3

**DETROIT (AP)**—Bruce MacGregor and Norm Ullman each scored twice Sunday night to pace Detroit Red Wings to a runaway 8-1 victory over the beleaguered Boston Bruins. It was Detroit's biggest offensive display of the season.

Bruin Goalie Ed Johnston faced 56 shots after a 46-shot bombardment during a 3-1 loss in Montreal Saturday night and, despite the score, was outstanding—few—the crippled, last-place Bruins.

MacGregor sandwiched his 11th and 12th goals of the season, a National Hockey League high, around Pit Martin's first goal in 11 games as the Wings grabbed a 3-0 first-period lead.

It easily could have been twice that as the Wings pumped 22 shots at Johnston while Boston could only fire three at Detroit goalie Roger Crozier.

Tom Williams scored his fifth of the season from a sharp angle at the side of the net at 5:27 of the second period.

But the wings took off again, this time with Ullman scoring his 17th and 18th—running his consecutive game scoring streak to five.

Ullman's first was a 35-footer into the short side at 11:10 and his second was a deflection of a point shot by Doug Barkley at 16:39 to make it 5-1.

In the final period, Ted Lindsay snapped in Eddie Joyal's rebound for his ninth goal at 6:29, and Alex Delvecchio

**TORONTO 3, NEW YORK 3**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—New York Rangers came from behind on Jean Ratelle's third-period goal for a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night.

The tie extended winless streaks for each club at Madison Square Garden this season. The fifth-place Rangers have not won a home game since last Nov. 25 when they beat the Leafs 6-3.

Ratelle tied the score at 7:52 of the final period, five minutes after junior-age rookie Britt Selby's first NHL goal had put the Leafs in front. Ratelle scored while each team was short-handed, drilling a 35-footer past partially screened Toronto goalie Johnny Bower. Bill Hicke assisted on the goal, Ratelle's third.

New York outshot the fourth-place Leafs 42-21, but Toronto capitalized on two tipped shots and a blazer 90 foot drive by defenceman Tim Horton.

The Leafs trailed 2-1 in the final minute of the second session when Horton's shot from centre ice bounded past New York goalie Jacques Plante.

# NCAA Will Stiffen Penalties In Future

**KANSAS CITY (AP)**—An amendment putting teeth into National Collegiate Athletic Association backing the U.S. Track and Field Federation in its battle with the Amateur Athletic Union is certain of approval at the 59th annual NCAA convention in Chicago Jan. 8-14.

Schools acting against NCAA policy in the AAU battle would be subject to the same severe penalties now imposed for recruiting violations. These include probation and bars from bowl games and national tournaments.

Another important amendment would establish an academic floor for NCAA member schools and NCAA-certified bowl games.

The fight between NCAA-backed federations and the AAU is certain to draw most of the national attention, regardless of other legislation.

A national track and field coalition designed to solve the bitter dispute likely will be proposed on the convention floor by the Eastern College Athletic Conference, which includes 131 NCAA members.

This likely will come in the form of a resolution that the NCAA and federation enter into negotiations with the AAU. It could bring a strong debate, but it's highly doubtful it would be passed.

Other important legislation includes a Big Eight proposal to put all athletic scholarships under a one-year term, subject to renewal each year; plus proposals that would open up associate NCAA membership to schools in Canada, would require more notice for council permission to take part in U.S. state department foreign travel and would consolidate cross-country administration under track and field.

# Great Improvement Shown By Bobby Hull This Year

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Bobby Hull's assault on the 50-goals scoring record has been the highlight of the first half of the 1964-65 National Hockey League season.

How come the dynamic left-winger with Chicago Black Hawks is moving at an unprecedented pace? Is he ready to join Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings, Maurice Richard, former Montreal Canadiens star, and others among the all-time greats?

A survey of opposing players and coaches unveiled these observations:

"Hull's slap shots from the blueline and even from a bad angle are more accurate this season," says veteran Toronto Maple Leaf goaltender Johnny Bower. "The power he gets behind his shots is remarkable. He has developed a good shift coming in and he gets the goalie to make the first move."

Leo Boivin of Boston Bruins, rated one of the NHL's hardest body-checkers, says Hull is "the strongest forward in the league. You have to try to get him over to the boards, but that isn't easy. He's like a bull."

"This season, Hull is coming down dead centre more," says Jacques Plante, New York Rangers' goalie and a six-time Vezina Trophy winner. "That gives him more of the net to shoot at. I used to be able to protect the angle on him."

He trails the play a lot more. His linemates set him up and he picks up the puck with more time to shoot and can get more power behind his slap

shot. If he shoots towards either corner of the net from 40 feet out, it's in the net eight times out of 10.

"Hull would break my face mask with one of his hard shots. His shot is like a piece of lead and sometimes it sinks three or four inches. You have to see it coming toward you to believe it."

Claude Provost of Montreal, a right-winger often assigned to Hull, advises: "You can't give him any room to get started. He'll beat you unless you stay right on top of him and this year it's been harder to do that."

Going into the Hawks' only weekend game—against Canadiens in Chicago Sunday night—Hull had amassed 31 goals in 34 games.

Hull, 25, is in his eighth NHL campaign. He scored 50 goals in 1961-62, tying the record set by Maurice (Rocket) Richard of Montreal Canadiens in 1944-45 and equaled by Bernie Geoffrion of the Canadiens in 1960-61.
