Wayne and Shuster Arrive in City Tonight

Johny Wayne and Frank Shuster arrive in Charlottetown by air this evening at 6:35 bringing with them a star-studded cast of 27 and a bag of gags for their two-week engagement at the start-studded theatre entitled "Wayne and Shuster in Charlottetown".

Canada's most famous comedy team, is returning to the Canadian stage after an absence of nearly six years. Supporting them in their show will be a galaxy of Canadian stage and television stars, including Corinne Colley, Paul Kligman, Betty Robertson, Don Gillies, Carlu Carter, Dr. W. pricing, and Claude Beaufort, office manager and accountant. Mr. Challier himself handles designing, mechanical drawings and art supervision.

The company, which employs a peak of 65 men in its compact shop, made its biggest breakthrough when it pushed a California competitor out of the Prairies, winning contracts for display booths and outdoor decorations at Winnipeg's Red River Exhibition, the Calgary Stampede, and the Regina, Saskatoon and Edmonton shows on the same exhibition circuit.

Three unloading zones on the west side of Main Street were suggested as a means of eliminating double parking but after some discussion it was decided to open up a suitable roadway

at the rear of the stores from Chivers to Poplar Street. The store owners are to be contacted for their views on the subject. A quantity of 100 will be required to widen and build up the present narrow roadway. It was stated.

It was also proposed that "no parking" signs be erected at the intersection of Main Street and a crosswalk be painted at Myricks Corner from Church Street to Main Street.

The present laws prohibiting double parking in the town are to be strictly enforced, it was agreed.

Marriages, Deaths Decrease; Births Up In July On Island

DEATHS were sharply down in the month to 84 as compared to 102 last July and for the year stand at 547 compared to 601.

Fewer Islanders are getting married this year with the wedding numbers 67 this July compared to 89 last year and the year's totals being 238 against 304.

In Canada as a whole, there were 38,558 births, 11,673 deaths and 13,375 marriages in July of this year. These figures compare to 42,283, 12,284 and 17,235 for July of 1963.

Speedy Sco Is Favorite

That monotonous refrain was heard at Roosevelt Raceway all week in regard to the likely winner of tonight's Sixth Roosevelt International Trot, one of harness racing's most glamorous and prestigious events.

On paper the Castleton Farm four-year-old colt outclasses Suzy Maguire, the favorite, defending champion; France's trio of Martin II, One and Papyrus II; and the 1963 West Germany's Pickwick F. and Sweden's Oikha.

Speedy Sco swept trotting's triple crown last year as a three-year-old and became the harness horse of the year. He has won seven of nine starts, including the Realization Trot and the American Trotting Club A championship last year which he set a world record.

This is no wonder that Speedy Sco and his driver, Ralph Baldwin, have been made the 5-4-5 morning line favorite. The expected crowd of 50,000 likely will see him win a \$25,000 purse, perhaps 2-5-5 or even 1-5-5.

There are a few, however, who believe in the slim possibility of an upset.

They consider three or four contenders the real odds-on. The second choice in the morning line at 4-1: One at 2-1; Martin II at 16-1 and New Hat, also had at 10-1. They also point to Papyrus, at 15-1, as a possible contender. He has lost 19 races although Gerhard Kruger, driver of Papyrus, says he believes he will finish last.
