K Of C Group Hears Speaker

Rev. Allan MacDonald of St. Dunstan's University was guest speaker for the third of a series of lectures at the Knights of Columbus Home in Charlottetown Tuesday evening.

Father MacDonald spoke on established institutions in the church mentioning sub-institutions such as religious orders and laymen's associations.

He referred to the divisions in society due largely to inequalities in spite of the present day emphasis on equality. Poverty, too, is receiving much more emphasis at this time.

Father MacDonald stressed the fact that the church continues to emphasize the common dignity of man. In these days of ecumenism, various reforms have already taken place in conformity with a continually changing world. However, he said, as Christ's purpose was to communicate with people through the church, the essence of the church cannot be changed.

It was felt that a re-valuation of some institutions was necessary because of the tendency of institutions to become over-organized.

He affirmed that there is no knowledge of reality without a knowledge of God.

Chairman of the meeting was Edmond LeClair, lecturer of the Charlottetown Council of the Knights of Columbus.

... certain corporations and persons."

An amendment to the Deposit Receipt Act, promoted by Provincial Treasurer Alban Farmer, gives the treasury power to pay up to six per cent interest on deposits left by the public in the treasury. The previous maximum rate was five per cent. The bill covering this change was given second reading.

Mr. Farmer also piloted an amendment provides that the government can invest funds with Royal Trust Company.

Also approved in principle was a bill amending the time in Public Office Act, allowing for closure on holidays to which the civil service is entitled or prothonotary's offices, probate and deed registry offices and the offices of county clerks.

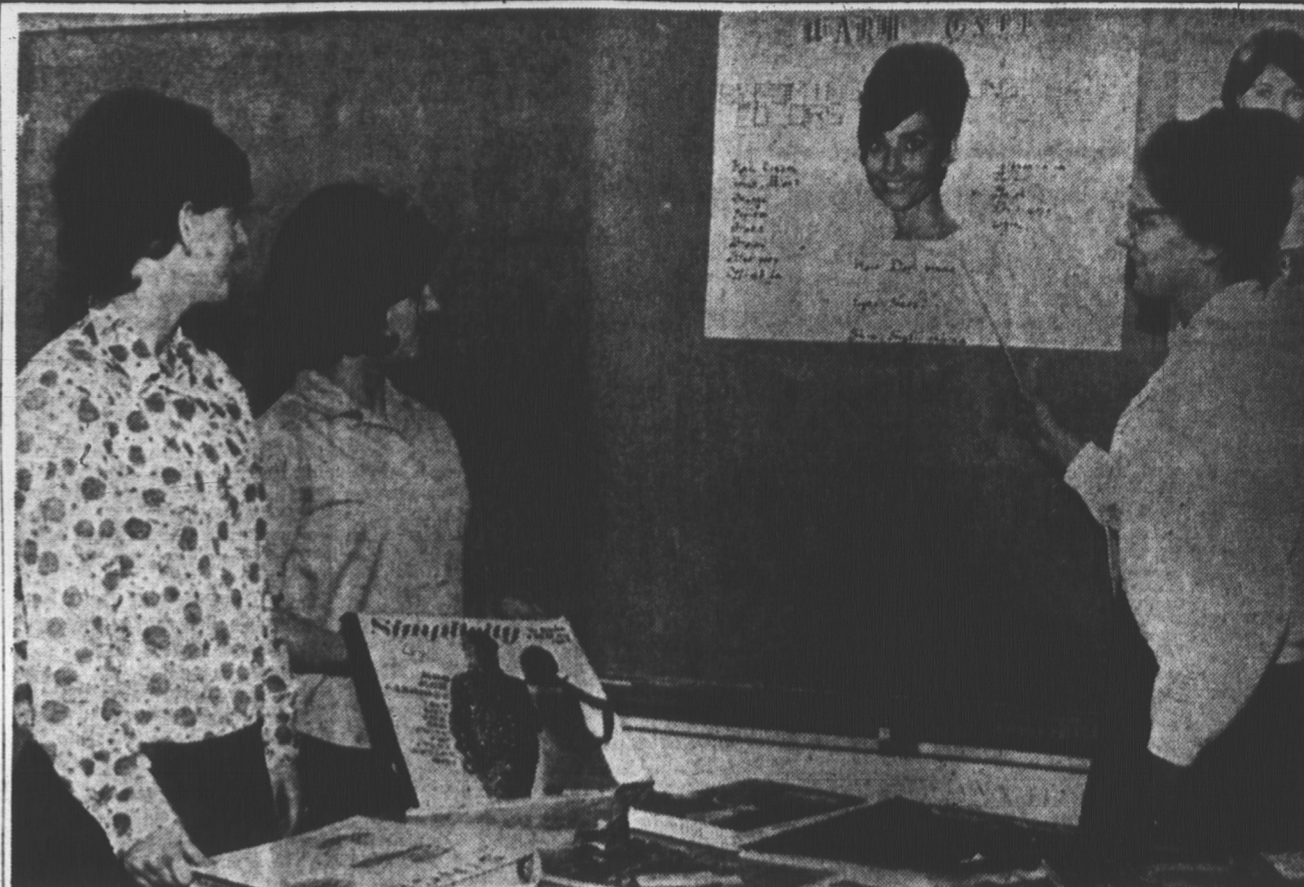

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says cloudy conditions over eastern regions Wednesday were caused by moist northerly winds circulating around a disturbance well to the southeast of Seble Island.
