"Spud Island Special" From Edmonton Due In Charlottetown July 19

Many former Islanders will be aboard the "Spud Island Special" which leaves the C.N.R. station at Edmonton, Alberta, on the 15th of this month for the Maritimes, arriving in Charlottetown at 6.10 p.m. on the 19th. This year's train will bring visitors from a widely spaced points as Parksville, B. C., Peace River Town, Alta., (nearly 400 miles north of Edmonton), Oyen in southern Alberta, Prince Albert in northern Saskatchewan, and from Estevan on the border between Saskatchewan and North Dakota.

U.S.A. Enquiries for the trip have been received from as far south as Sunnyvale, California. The excursion is a non-profit venture, sponsored by the Maritime Provinces Association of Edmonton, and will bring greetings to the Prince Edward Island Exhibition Association from the President of the Edmonton Exhibition Association.
