Fashion Designers Plan Creation Of Distinctive Canadian Styles

MONTRÉAL, (CP)—Canadian designers of women's clothes plan to bid for greater recognition in the field of midday's fashions.

Six designers meeting here discussed plans to form what may turn out to be the nucleus of a "haute couture" group for Canada. Aim of the group will be to agree on distinctive Canadian styles that will attract a national and international clientele.

The conference included Paris-born Raoul-Jean Fouré who has designed in Canada for 25 years and who styled the gown worn by the wife of Prime Minister St. Laurent at the Coronation; Marcel Martel, veteran Montreal designer,

Also in the group were France Davies, who designed a skirt for the Queen when she visited Canada, and Jacques de Montjoye who was trained at the Chambre Syndicale de la Couture Parisienne in Paris. Josef Foch represented Norbert Niewelt, a Czech couturier who now makes his home here.

"If we feel we can achieve more as a group than by working individually," said Mr. Fouré, "why should designers have to go outside the country to gain recognition? If we are united we should be strong enough to make our presence felt in establishing a Canadian culture."

One objective of the proposed association is a fashion show in the near future. Aim of this and future shows would be to attract customers from Canada and other countries.

Membership in the new organization would be limited to persons making their living as designers. A committee would be established to maintain high standards within the association.

AID YOUNG DESIGNERS

Paris-born Mr. de Montjoye said he feels the association would help young designers trying to become established. He himself came to Canada four years ago and worked with Mr. Fouré before going into business for himself in 1952.

France Davies, who was born in Paris, also worked with Mr. Fouré before opening her own salon in 1950. Miss Davies' greatest triumph as a designer came when the town of Longueuil, Que., asked her to make a skirt for them to present to the Queen, then Princess Elizabeth, when she visited Canada. The skirt was accepted by the Queen and later a copy was exhibited by the Canadian government at Rockefeller Centre in New York.



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
