

On Lecture Visit To Saint Dunstan's University Students

Miss Irene Naughton of the Catholic Worker Movement arrived in Charlottetown last night for a four-day lecture visit to the students of St. Dunstan's University. Miss Naughton is presently making a tour of Catholic Colleges in the Maritime Provinces under the sponsorship of the Social Philosophy Dept. of St. Dunstan's University, and has completed visits to Mount Saint Vincent's College and St. Mary's College, Halifax, Saint Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, and the Extension Department of St. F.X. U. in Sydney. Following her visit to St. Dunstan's, she will spend three days with the students of St. Thomas College, Chatham, N.B.

Served With U.S. Army

During the war Miss Naughton served with the land army in the United States in order to gain experience and write more knowledgeably about the village community and the farm, since she has long held the distributorship position. In an interview last night, Miss Naughton explained that distributors want to distribute economic control as widely as possible by means of direct family ownership of land and capital. This, of course, means co-operation among these personal owners and involves numerous conditions, complications, and compromises which can only be worked out in the course of the program itself.

TO INSTALL TURBINE

Excavation for the laying of the foundation of the new turbine to be installed at the Maritime Electric Company at Charlottetown will begin in about three weeks time, it was learned last night. The majority of the parts required to set up the estimated \$200,000 turbine have arrived in the city.

BRACKENS PURCHASE CATTLE

Among cattle reported to have been purchased by Mr. John Bracken and his son George during their recent visit to the Island were five Ayrshires from the herd of Andrew MacRae and Son, Central Royalty. The Brackens viewed Island cattle and horses during their three-day visit to the Island last week. It is not believed that they purchased any horses.

NEW ELECTRIC LINES PLANNED

The Maritime Electric Company expect to put in about seventy-five miles of lines this year, it was learned from the Manager, Mr. V.A. Ainsworth, last night. Work on the rural lines will not commence until around May 15 due to the road conditions. This places the company about two weeks behind last year's schedule as they commenced line work around May 1.

WORK PROGRESSING

Work on the new railway wharf is going ahead rapidly now that the fine weather is here. Higher freight rates have brought about the need for the new wharf which is being constructed by the Canadian Dredge and Dock Co. Ltd., with their superintendent T. A. Laster on the job. In 1927 approximately fifty percent of shipments from P. E. I. were made by rail. Recently however, it has been estimated that almost eighty percent is going by truck. With the new wharf it is expected that much more produce will be shipped by water than has been possible in the past. In addition to the new 50 by 380 foot shed which is to be built, it is also planned to have a 40 foot apron on the East side of the wharf to facilitate loading and unloading. At present 32 concrete piles have been driven, each one weighing between twelve and thirteen tons. It will take 156 piles to form the foundation for the new shed. Ice on the river has held up dredging operations, but these are expected to commence within the next two or three weeks.
