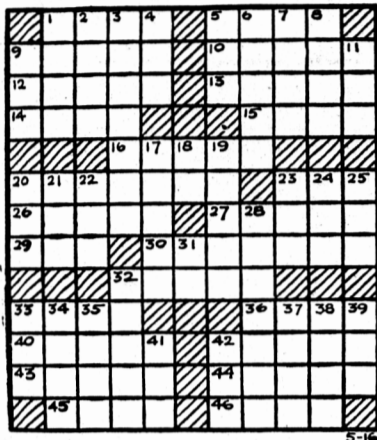

Work Commenced On Montague Streets

"Pools and Beer Construction Co., Montague, has undertaken the ditching and grading of the streets of the town this week preparatory to gravelling. Drains which have been giving improper drainage have been cleared, and small culverts have been removed to permit an unobstructed flow of water to carry-off pipes.

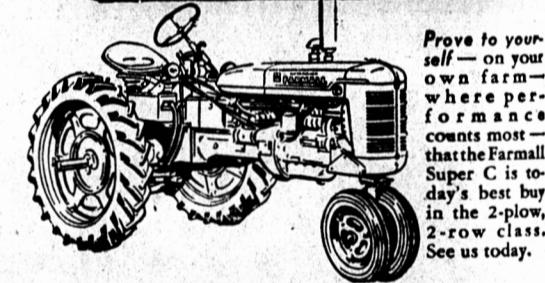
The work of gravelling began yesterday on Fraser Street, and will be continued until all streets have been completed.

These streets are included in the paving project for this year, a total distance of 1 1/4 miles. With the conclusion of the surveying, a report will be submitted to the Town Council.
