Father Howell Addresses Liturgical Institute Session

Father Clifford Howell of the English order of the Jesuits gave his third major address of the Liturgical Institute at yesterday morning's plenary session at the Basilica Recreation Centre. Chairman William Simpson in opening the session noted that perhaps the most important part of the three-day Institute would be the topic then under study, "The Mass" as this is regarded as the highest form of participation and worship in the liturgy of the Catholic Church.

Father Howell concentrated on aspects of the Mass which he felt would be less known to delegates, for the scope of this topic has been covered in millions of books by Catholic writers in every period of history, he said. He traced the history of the Mass as a form of worship. Much of the general background has been found by modern research into ancient rabbinical practices and involvement at the deeper levels of "Mind and Heart", which is the theme of the Institute, so that all aspects of the Mass may be unified.

Following the address, Father Howell conducted the clergy discussion group, "The Parish as a Community" while the Sisters and the laity held their separate special interest groups. Workshops filled the afternoon agenda for the more than 500 delegates.

HALIFAX (CP) - The weather office says cloudy skies and showers are forecast for all three provinces today.

They will begin in southern New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and south western Nova Scotia in the morning, and in the remainder of Nova Scotia in the afternoon. A few thunderstorms may occur in some places. The shower activity will end tonight.

The disturbance is expected to be far enough east of the district so that Saturday will be generally sunny in all regions. Afternoon temperatures Saturday are expected to reach the seasonal low to mid 70s.

Regional forecast: Prince-Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties: Mostly cloudy, scattered showers and chance of a thundershower beginning this morning and ending tonight; cooler; winds southwest 20.
