Banking Finance Report Face Gloom in Nov.

OTTAWA (CP)—Within three months the government will be facing the dramatic, complicated task of tracing the flow of credit in Canada and deciding how it should be changed—if at all—for the good of the economy.
The job will involve the opening of every financial institution's books and the public issues including live mortgages and consumer credit.

So little time may remain for detailed government study of the Porter report, preparation of amending legislation and hearings by the Commons bank and commerce committee that the government may have to extend the life of the present act, probably for a year.
Key issues for the committee whether the six-per-cent interest ceiling on bank loans should be raised or erased from the act entirely, and whether the banks should be allowed into the field of mortgage lending. Both issues have political overtones.
As for consumer credit, the Porter commission's findings are likely to be placed before the Joint Commons-Senate committee which the Pearson government has said it intends to be set up on this subject.

Talks Begin With U.S. On 12-Mile Limit

OTTAWA (CP)—Negotiations have begun here with the United States on the Canadian government's election pledge to impose a 12-mile fishing limit in coastal waters.
External Affairs Minister Martin and U.S. Ambassador Wilton Butterworth headed the two delegations—for the initial discussions at least. Later, senior officials carried on in the operating round of what is expected to be a lengthy procedure.

SEMINARS BEGIN ON NEW ALPHABET

BETHLEHEM, Pa. (AP)—Lehigh University has begun a week-long series of seminars designed to familiarize educators in Canada and the United States with the standard 43-letter alphabet to speed up the teaching of reading.
The alphabet already is being used in Britain where it was developed by Sir James Pitman, whose grandfather was the inventor of the shorthand and shorthand writing system.

When they finally floated free their motor wouldn't start.

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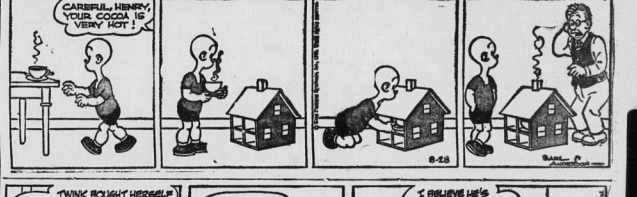
