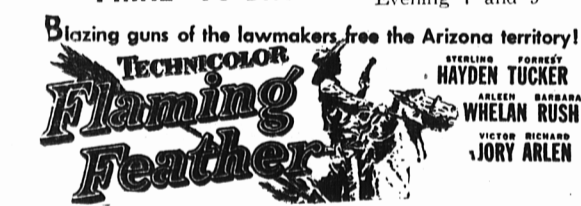

Fine New Public Library Opened At Murray Harbour

A fine new building for the Murray Harbour Public Library was officially opened Thursday evening, Nov. 20, by Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy-Minister of Education at a largely attended public gathering.

Previous to the opening a programme and lunch were provided in the Community Hall. Rev. Wallace MacPherson acted as chairman. In his remarks Mr. MacPherson thanked all those who had contributed their support towards the new building and also the Prince Edward Island Libraries Staff for their assistance in committee work and in reorganizing the book collection.

Mr. H. B. Chandler, Director of Libraries, then outlined the work of the committee in planning the new library and commented particularly on the cooperation of the communities of Murray Harbour, Gunsey Cove, Beach Point, White Sands and Abney which made completion of the project possible in such a short time. In addition to money, a great amount of voluntary labour had been contributed, and at a very busy season.

Mr. Chandler introduced the chief speaker, Dr. L. W. Shaw, who called attention to the educational services within the community, the school, home, church and day to day contacts with others, and the function each played in development. He referred to the library as the heart of the educational life providing new ideas and experiences to enrich the community. Books could provide practical introduction in many crafts and not least give pleasure and entertainment, understanding and appreciation of life in all its aspects.
