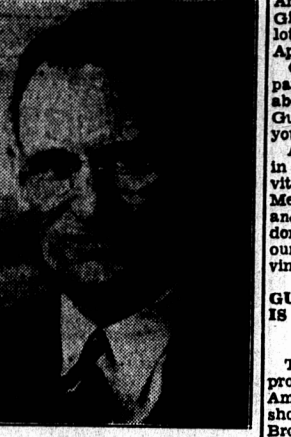
During the past few years his breeding operations had progressed to a point where he had several excellent race prospects, and they were particularly good, and the Colonel last winter spent much time in watching their training and development.

Continued from page 1. the "rate and extent" by which the armed forces of each nation must be expanded. He didn't say what action was taken on the proposal, but commented: "Just as the spokesman for that small nation indicated, as these defensive plans develop traditions will have to give way to reality."

"And even our own balance of United States forces - if we expand beyond the present levels - may have to give way to the theory of national specialization, which will fit into an over-all balance for collective defence.

"For example, the North Atlantic Treaty defensive plans might require from us a greater air force, or a greater navy, than we ourselves might be willing to provide.
