

# Islanders To Perform In Royal Variety Show

Island talent will take part in the "Royal Variety Performance" in the Confederation Centre Theatre before Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and party on the evening of Oct. 6.

Official announcement of the first Canadian "Royal Variety Performance" was made Friday.

Island performers who will be appearing will be Miss Maida Rogerson and the P.E.I. Centennial Choir.

Master of ceremonies will be Lorne Green, Canadian actor and television's "Bonanza."

Other performers will be: Halifax's Forti White, Miss White, according to Mavor Moore is one of the great Negro singers of the world. She is famous both as a classical singer and as a spiritual singer.

From Montreal will be Gracie Gelinas and Yves Lelonde. Mr. Gelinas is French-Canada's most beloved actor, especially well known for his Comtesse character "Fridolin" and for his authorship of Canada's successful play "Ti-Coq." It is a royal variety show that Mr. Gelinas and Mr. Lelonde will perform.

Paul Anka of Ottawa, one of the top "rock and roll" singers and composers in the world is expected to perform. His appearance was to be confirmed.

Anna Russell, now performing in New York, is said to be the greatest musical satirist. Miss Russell recently completed a "one-man" show in New York and is famous for her recording, "Anna Russell Sings."

"The Travelers," from Toronto, one of Canada's best comedy acts, will be depicting a scene in which he is a very tired and fed-up Montrealer at the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa. Islanders will remember Tuesday Mr. Colin McMillan as the same incident here in "The Best of Spring Thaw."

# Penitentiary Term Imposed For Robbery

Robbery and possession of stolen goods, both involving monetary values of less than \$50, resulted in respective three and one year terms in Dorchester Penitentiary for a Charlottetown man, Victor Thomas Henigar, when he appeared before city police court Magistrate A. J. Hastings Thursday.

The two sentences will run concurrently.

Henigar was convicted of the robbery charge on Sept. 5, when he was remanded in custody for sentencing, and of the possession charge yesterday. The incident leading up to the robbery charge occurred on Sept. 7, when Henigar was alleged to have stolen a wallet containing \$25 from John Baker of 181 Prince Street. The possession of stolen goods offence involved a car radio stolen from David G. O'Hanley of Charlottetown, late last month.

Also appearing on a robbery charge in connection with the same incident was Garnet James Livingston, also of Charlottetown, who was sentenced to six

months in Queens County Jail. Livingston had been found guilty of the charge on Sept. 17, and remanded then until yesterday for sentencing.

Five persons were fined on speeding charges. Four of them — Daniel Harold Russell, Parkdale; Harry Acorn, Charlottetown; Beaumont Newport, New Wilshire; Ralph MacFadyen, Hunter River; and Nadine Fraser, Parkdale — were fined \$10 and costs or five days. Paul Vandergast of North River Road was fined \$15 and costs or five days on a similar charge.

Walter S. Toole of Bonshaw was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to dim his headlights.

One man was given a 30-day suspended sentence for being drunk and incapable.
