Let's Talk It Over by "C"

That teachers of English grammar in days of yore required memorization of a lot of terms and definitions which were of no use to the youth striving to improve his English speaking and writing seems to be pretty well established in this threshold of the second half of the twentieth century. We of the old guard hate to admit this, and sometimes we get stubborn about it, and refuse to budge an inch from our time-honored positions. We refuse to listen to those annoying people who insist on turning our cherished beliefs and traditions upside down to see if they are all we claim them to be.

On the other hand, the reformers may often overreach themselves in their zeal for change. It behooves us to review our grammar instruction methods without the prejudice which long familiarity creates, and with a view to finding out just how much grammatical paraphernalia we need to keep our pupils improving their speaking and writing processes. We shall probably land somewhere half way between the "old guard" and what they call the "fuddy-duddy grammarians of yesterday."

QUEBEC-(CP)—Leo Bouchard, manager of Fernando Gagnon, Canadian bantamweight boxing champion, said Wednesday his fighter is willing to give anybody a title bout provided the financial terms are right.

It made the statement in reply to a challenge made in Toronto Saturday by Jimmy Jones, manager of Edmonton bantamweight Jersey Joe Edwards.

Jones, who also manages Canadian heavyweight champ Earl Walls, said he doesn't much care where the bout is held, just as long as Edwards gets a shot at the crown.

The Canadian Boxing Federation rates Edwards No. 1 challenger for the bantam title.
