The School Plant In Education

Educational objectives were outlined in the previous article in this series. If we are to achieve these objectives we will have need of special facilities and equipment.

The Matthews Report on our Four City Schools assesses our present facilities and compares them with what we should have.

3rd Installment

Forming the backbone of any educational enterprise are the teacher, the educational program, and the school plant.

Homemaking Facilities

Girls, by and large, eventually become homemakers. This is especially true in Charlottetown.

The Richmond Square students receive additional homemaking instructions in courses in sewing, weaving, and crocheting in their school.

At present, Domestic Science, as it is called, is limited entirely to elementary pupils.

An effective and interesting homemaking course must include more than cooking and sewing instructions in general home management, nursing, child care, consumer education, laundry, interior decorating, dressmaking, and other subjects useful and important to homemaking.

Communities that have homemaking courses in their school systems have found that such courses pay dividends in terms of happier and healthier homes.

Industrial Arts

Children of a generation ago lived largely in an agricultural-lumbering-fishing society in Canada. Today, the country is fast becoming an industrial society.

The child's domestic life is centered around machines and appliances. It is becoming extremely necessary for children and youth to become familiar with the intricacies and functional characteristics of these mechanical aids to living.

In order to provide for these needs, the schools must have space and equipment. Basic equipment needed includes workbenches, tools, tables, lockers, cabinets, stoves, sinks, and other miscellaneous gear.

One of the major objectives of the Charlottetown schools should be to develop the latent mechanical skills of its pupils.

The school program should not be dedicated to preparing future professional people alone. A program that meets the needs of the non-professional citizens must not be denied.

The lack of local school facilities for a broad program in industrial arts is a glaring shortcoming in the Charlottetown schools.

The school auditorium is an educational necessity in the elementary school. It cannot be called an educational "frill" because it meets a definite educational need.

A well-organized and well-rounded school program presents many occasions when large groups of children should be assembled. Dramatic, musical, and forensic activities should be a part of the pupils' school program.

If the school is a "community school" there will be many occasions when large groups of adults meet in the auditorium for educational, recreational, and civic purposes.

In order that an auditorium perform these tasks, it must have appropriate size, stage facilities, and equipment.
