NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27.

In consequence of having received a telegraph dispatch announcing the nomination of Her Excellency's second son to a cadetship, the Countess of Dufferin proposes to return to England next Saturday. Colonel Littleton, who goes home on leave, accompanied by Mrs. Littleton, will sail in the same ship. The Conservative picnic to-day was largely attended. There has been no extra influx of visitors to Toronto. This morning's affair is looked upon as a sort of money making affair.

BERLIN, Aug. 27.

A Vienna despatch says that in the Cabinet Council on Saturday Count Andrassy declared himself convinced of the necessity of a Convention with Turkey on the basis of acknowledging the Sultan's sovereignty in Bosnia and Herzegovina; but as regards duration of occupation, merely admitting it to be nominal.

BELGRADE, Aug. 27.

The entire Servian Ministry has resigned. Rectics have been entrusted with the formation of another Cabinet.

BERLIN, Aug. 27.

The German Federal Council has adopted the bill against Socialists as amended by the Judicial Committee. The amendments provide that the police authorities of the different States, and not the Central Federal authorities, shall be empowered to prohibit Socialist associations, and that appeals must be taken to the Committee of the Federal Council and not to an Imperial bureau.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 27.

To-day is the worst thus far since the prevalence of fever. The deaths aggregate 32, and there are 96 new cases.

The British bark Warrior was passed in lat. 46, long. 28, a complete wreck.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

The health of troops in Cyprus has much improved.

Jackson, Berjer & Co., Commission Merchants, of London, have suspended. Liabilities \$150,000.

The passage to be selected for translation to be taken from the Roman History at the end.
