

# Guardian's New Home Is Visited By Hundreds

Several hundred guests from Summerside and district attended the open house held yesterday afternoon and evening, following the official opening by Mayor W.A. Currie of the new building which is the Summerside home of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot.

In a brief ceremony at 4:15 p.m. His Worship cut open a bundle of Evening Patriots held by George Clow, manager of the Summerside Bureau, to symbolize the opening of the building, as the paper went into distribution to Summerside homes.

Mayor Currie, in speaking briefly, welcomed the new building as a fine addition to Summerside and as a recognition by the papers of the importance of the reader audience reached in the area.

### LONG HISTORY

Speaking particularly of The Guardian, he pointed to the occasion as an important one in its long history — a history during which, he said, it had earned a notable reputation for presenting the news impartially and fairly.

The paper, he continued, has always supported those things that were for the good of the community or the province. His Worship saw a healthy situation, too, in the friendly rivalry that has existed between the paper and The Journal-Pioneer of Summerside.

Mayor Currie was thanked in behalf of the papers by Mr. Clow, who presented him with the scissors used in the official opening as a memento of the occasion.

## Meeting Will Consider Plans For New School

**O'LEARY** — Plans to consider the building of a regional high school to serve some 40 communities in the O'Leary area will be aired at a meeting slated here Monday at 8 p.m.

Delegates from 40 communities ranging from Ellerslie to Elmsdale are expected to attend.

Deputy minister and director of education, Malcolm MacKenzie, of Charlottetown and Alberton school inspector Merritt Callaghan will be in attendance to outline the necessary requirements of such a school and report on the part that will be played by the government, if the project materializes.

### FIRST MOVE

According to a Provincial Act the government will assist in the cost of erecting such a school building and bear 40 percent of the operating cost thereafter, plus the usual arrangements for the transportation of children.

However, the first move is for the people of the district concerned to get together in a common understanding of what is involved in such an undertaking.

When all aspects of the plan have been discussed, including proportionate tax support, a vote will be taken through the district.

This regional high school would be supported, apart from help from government sources, by a tax levied proportionately on each district according to the number of its pupils.

Its administrative body would be composed of a central board of trustees representing each of the districts.

Last year a delegation of O'Leary citizens appealed to the minister of education to have Grade XII added to the curriculum of their school. However, since the number of students was not sufficient to meet the requirements of the act, the request had to be turned down.

## Fraud Try Stopped By Housewife

**KENSINGTON** — Two phony collectors had their attempt to fraudulently solicit money for the Red Cross halted Thursday night by an alert and suspicious Kensington housewife.

The pair, had already made several calls through the town and had collected "donations" from at least two persons, before they were asked to produce credentials.

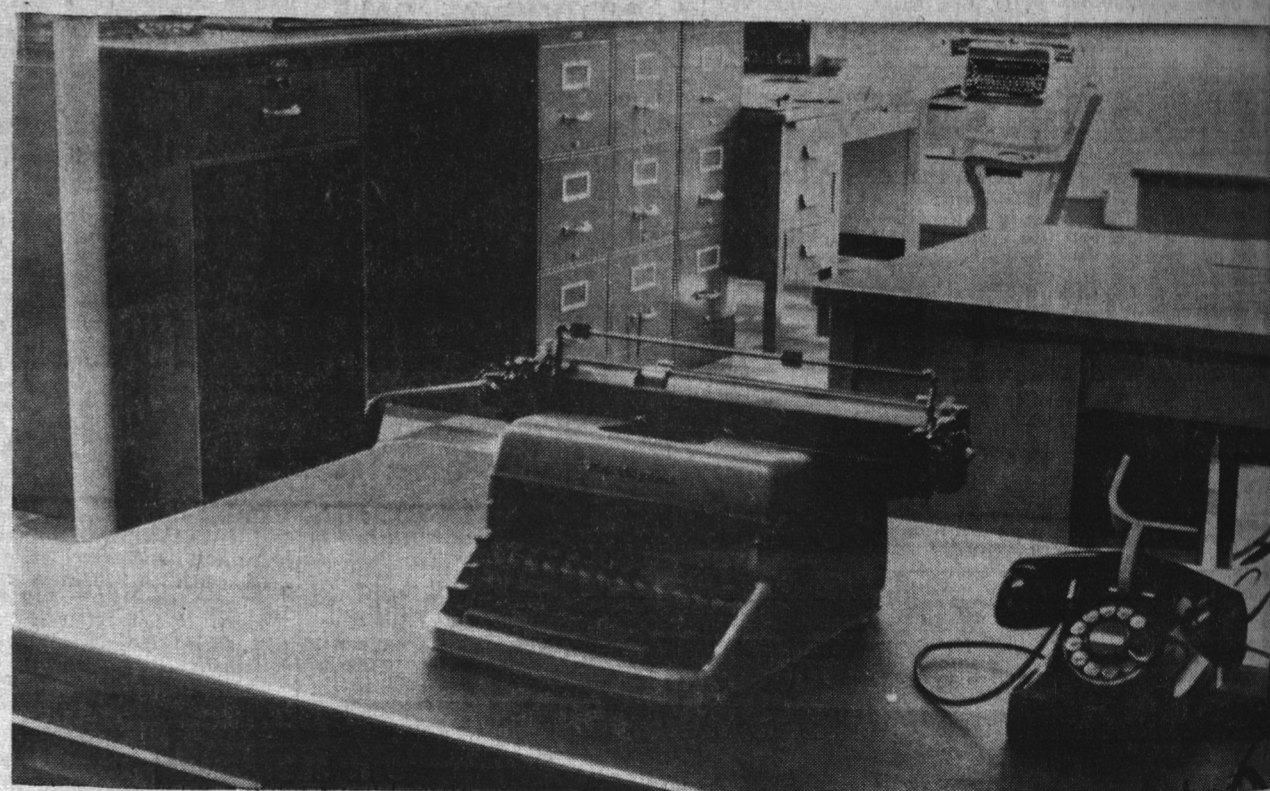
