Heavy Docket Faces Kings Co. Magistrate

GEORGETOWN — One of the largest dockets in months confronted Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday. Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan conducted the prosecution for the Crown.

George Ivan McKeeman, Montague, charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired, gave evidence on his own behalf and the case was adjourned to May 23. The accused is represented by J.P. Nicholson.

Raymond Boswell MacCallum of Marshfield charged with impaired driving and who is also represented by Mr. Nicholson pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned to May 16 in Charlottetown where a date will be fixed for trial.

Also adjourned to Charlottetown on May 16 to fix a date for a hearing was the case of Aeneas Ronald MacIntyre of Bedford. He was charged with impaired driving and is represented by Mr. Nicholson.

Howard John MacDonald of Albion Cross charged with impaired driving and who is represented by S.S. Hession, QC, had his case adjourned with consent to May 23.

Russell Merrill Poole of Montague, was fined \$100 and costs when he pleaded guilty to impaired driving, and Carl James Grevin, Cardigan, pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving and his case was adjourned by consent to June 6. He is represented by Mr. Nicholson.

Three others were each fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

In the highway section of the court, Alfred MacDonald of Seven Mile Road was fined \$10 for driving without due care and attention, and Douglas Roy MacEachern, Cardigan was fined \$15 and costs on a similar charge.

Joseph Marie Murrums, Sturdevant was fined \$10 and costs for speeding on the open highway in excess of 60 m.p.h.
