

New York Yankees In 5-1 "Must" Win Over Brooklyn Dodgers To Tie Up Series

NEW YORK (AP) — Chunky White Ford threw a brilliant four-hitter at Brooklyn after New York Yankees pounced on rookie Karl Spooner for five runs in the first inning to square the world series with a 5-1 "must" victory in the sixth game at Yankee Stadium Monday.

It didn't take long for the Yankees, backed up against the walls of their own big park by three defeats in Brooklyn's much smaller Ebbets Field, to make certain the series went the full seven games.

Two walks, two singles and Bill Skowron's three-run homer, about 350 feet into the lower rightfield seats, left the Dodgers five runs behind before the first five runs were scored.

Alston got his 24-year-old left-hander out of action after that it was up to Ford, whose left-hand pitches had won he series opener.

Ford was up to the job, turning in a steady effort that surpassed his earlier start when he had to be relieved in the ninth.

SNIDER INJURES KNEE
Dodger hopes received a cruel blow in the third inning when Duke Snider, the home run hero of the series with four in the first five games, had to leave the lineup because his left knee "popped" as he chased an outfield fly by Bill Skowron.

Snider's injury wasn't known to the 64,022 fans and the reporters until Don Zimmer came up to bat for the centre fielder in the fourth. All even at three victories each, the clubs come up to today's

To his left were Premiers Duplessis of Quebec, Flemming of New Brunswick, Bennett of British Columbia, Manning of Alberta and Smallwood of Newfoundland.

OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders tonight released assistant coach John Idzik.

Club president Dave Gill announced Idzik's release, effective immediately, after a meeting of the Rough Riders' full executive.

The executive meeting followed a four-hour luncheon meeting of the Big Four club's player management committee held to straighten out difficulties due to a feud between Idzik and head coach Chan Caldwell.

The trouble has been brewing for weeks between coach Chan Caldwell and assistant coach John Idzik. It apparently reached a head Saturday when Riders were whipped 40-0 by Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

ADMIT DISSENSION

Brooklyn's Duke Snider Vows He'll Play Today Despite An Injured Knee

NEW YORK, (AP)—Duke Snider, on the verge of writing his name with baseball's greatest in world series annals, vowed Monday he will play today despite his injured knee—and it feels pretty good.

The big, handsome Brooklyn Dodger popped a cartilage when he stepped in a hole running for Moose Skowron's fly in the third. "My knee popped as soon as I started," he said somberly. "I

went on running,"—and caught the ball—"but it was a leg I hurt earlier in Chicago, and so I asked Walt Alton to take me out."

"In Chicago I was so stiff I could hardly walk the next day. But now I'll pay even if it's stiff."

PODRES PITCHES TODAY
Snider has hit four home runs in this series, and now has a total of nine in series play—only one behind the great Lou Gehrig of the Yankees. Babe Ruth heads the list with 15.

Manager Walt Alton was as sober and quiet as his big centre-fielder. He confirmed what he said Sunday, namely, that he will start John Podres on the mound today. Podres won the third game when the Yankees beat the Dodgers 3-2.

Under normal circumstances catcher Roy Campanella, with his rifle arm, might have caught Phil Rizzuto in the first inning of Monday's game when he stole second after getting a base on balls. It looked as if Gilliam was slow in covering the bag.
