

# Youth Club Whips Flyers 10-3 In Game At Arena

The Basilio Youth Club ended the 5-game winning streak of the Island Senior Hockey League-leading Parkdale Flyers with a bang at the Sports Arena last night by soundly thumping Allie Carver's Parkdale crew 10-3.

The rejuvenated youth club was led to victory once again by a combination of experience and youth as wily Buck Whitlock and youthful Merrill Pineau pooled their talents to pace the B.Y.C. to their third straight victory and bring them out of the league cellar into fourth place ahead of Montague Primroses.

### SCORES FOUR

Pineau fired 4 goals and set up Whitlock's lone tally to move into contention with Orin Carver as the league's leading sniper and Whitlock assisted on four goals besides scoring once to bring his lifetime scoring total to an unofficial 996 points.

Other B.Y.C. marksmen were Lloyd Shepherd with two and Jack

Burke, Spy Ready and Johnny Squarebriggs with singles. Parkdale scorers were Willie Dunn, Bob Hurry and Orin Carver, whose first-period goal gave him 26 for the season.

### FLYERS IN LEAD

Three times in the first period the Flyers went into the lead and three times lost it. The period ended 3-3 and from the second period onward the youth club fired seven goals without a reply. Five of them came in a big second period to run their lead to 8-3 and they came through with two more in a ragged third period.

The game was cleanly played and only five penalties were called. However penalties were costly items for the Flyers who saw two goals scored while they had men in the box in the middle session. Junior MacLeod and Kip Ready were both serving minor terms when Pineau shot the B.Y.C. into a 6-3 lead and Ready was still there when Pineau was back again

for his fourth goal of the night and a 7-3 lead.

Thane Doyle played a flawless hockey for the youth club in the last forty minutes of the game to shutout the Flyers. He was called on to make several fine saves but was nowhere as busy as Frank Roper at the opposite end of the rink. B.Y.C. threw rubber at Roper from every angle throughout the game and in the last six minutes of the second period the puck was hardly out of the Parkdale end for more than seconds at a time. Roper kicked away 36 of the 48 shots sent his way and Doyle had a much milder evening handling 24 of 27 drives.

### SEE-SAW BATTLE

The first period was a see-saw battle all the way. Flyers went into a 1-0 lead at 4:05 as Allie Carver slipped a slick pass to Willie Dunn who broke into the clear around the youth club defense. Dunn kicked Doyle out of position and slipped the puck into the net.

At 10:43 Whitlock whistled a shot from well out that Pineau tipped between Roper's pads to tie the score but a minute later Parkdale was in front again as Bob Hurry slapped in Orin Carver's pass out from behind the net.

Lloyd Shepherd scored on a solo effort after he scooped the puck from a Parkdale defenseman at 12:46 and again the Flyers went into the lead at 14:28 when Orin Carver deflected Hurry's pass behind Doyle.

However, that was the last time the Flyers were to beat Doyle for the rest of the game and after Johnny Squarebriggs tied the score at 3:3 at 17:30 as he banged away at the puck around the net until it got by Roper, the B.Y.C. really began to roll as the second period got underway.

Pineau fired the goal that proved to be the winner at 1:18 taking Whitlock's pass and scoring from directly in front. Lloyd Shepherd halted in Squarebriggs' shadow from 10 feet for a 5-3 lead and then as the Flyers picked up a couple of penalties Pineau scored twice. Burke ended the scoring in the second when Mullins sent him into the clear on the right side.

### PRETTY GOAL

Coach Jack Ready whizzed in Whitlock's pass at 11:45 of the third period and Whitlock scored the prettiest goal of the evening to round things up. He exceptionally started the play himself when he took the puck in the corner and circled around the Parkdale defense. He flipped a pass to Pineau coming in on the right side and Pineau, finding himself well covered, sent it back to Whitlock, who had an open side to shoot at.

CHATTER Pineau missed a fifth goal when he blasted a shot off the crossbar in the third. Roper made a marvellous save off Whitlock just after Buck scored his only goal. Whitlock was in all alone and elected to shoot but Roper got his arm on the wicked drive. The crowd numbered about 900 which was exceptionally good considering the poor travelling conditions. The game was rather spotty and not as good as the other two encounters. It was third win in a row for the B.Y.C.

They can now be considered a team to reckon with. Orin Carver has 46 points now but Pineau is moving at a faster rate of late and is now in second place with 34 points. Whitlock is in the thick of things already. He now has 22 points. B.Y.C. travel to Summerside Monday night. At the Arena on Tuesday Saints and Montague meet again and the Flyers and youth club play again Thursday.

## Is Surprised By Newsmen Boarding Train To Detroit

BOSTON (AP)—Terry Sawchuk, suspended Boston Bruins goalkeeper, Thursday insisted "I've quit (hockey) and I'm gonna stay quit." Surprised by newspaper men as he prepared to board a train for Detroit, Sawchuk was curt and tense. "I'm mad. I'm not talking," he said. "I wasn't hiding out. I was locked up in my room and I didn't answer the telephone or the door. And I got news for you. I'm gonna sue four Boston newspapers for what they said about me when I got home." Sawchuk was suspended Wednesday by Milt Schmidt, coach of the Boston National Hockey League club after he failed to show for a practice session as ordered. He had told Schmidt Tuesday night he was quitting the team. The suspension could be for life unless the Bruins reinstate him. Schmidt imposed the suspension with one proviso: "If he's sick we'll have him tended to and he'll be the first to apologize to him." Sawchuk was sought by club officials, players and newspaper men since Tuesday night when Schmidt announced Norm Defelice, 23, was being recalled from Hershey to play in goal for the Bruins.

## Canada's Marksmen Capture King George V Rifle Trophy

LONDON (CP)—Canada's young marksmen have captured the King George V trophy in Commonwealth shooting competition for the first time since 1933, the National Rifle Association announced Thursday. In a second event, the crack St. Couter De Marie cadet corps from Shediac, N.B., retained the senior imperial shield for the best senior unit in the Commonwealth. The announcement covers results of shoots held in 1955. The King George V trophy, premier award of the imperial challenge shields competition, was put up for competition in 1925 and Canada has won the event six times. The trophy is awarded to the Commonwealth country showing the highest musketry efficiency in the imperial challenge trophy competitions. There is no limit on the number of entries from any country and results are based on the score of 88.07 out of a possible 100. South Africa, which had 6,085 entries, was second with an 88.02 average and the United Kingdom followed with 87.41. # Detroit Red Wings And Boston Battle To 2-2 Tie

BOSTON (CP)—Boston Bruins held second place Detroit Red Wings to a 2-2 National Hockey League tie tonight with stand-in goalie Norm Defelice making a total of 24 saves.

It was the first test for the Bruins, in third place, since their all-star goalie Terry Sawchuk left the team and was suspended. Veteran Detroit winger Ted Lindsay tipped Gordie Howe's blue line shot past Defelice, up from Hershey Bears, at 13:18 of the final period for the tie.

The outcome left the Red Wings four points behind league-leading Montreal and Boston two back of Detroit.

Defelice, who had filled in for Sawchuk earlier this year when he was ill, appeared nervous in the first period but settled down as the contest progressed. The kid who won seven of his last eight games at Hershey, turned in 34 saves to 26 for Detroit's Glenn Hall.

Larry Regan, a 26-year-old rookie centre, put the Bruins in front 2-1 at 8:57 of the third period on a magnificent three-

no-roure. Regan jumped over one harassing defender at centre ice, got around defenceman Marcel Pronovost and slipped in a 15-footer while skating full speed.

Bill Dineen opened the scoring for Detroit in the first period but Jerry Toppazzini, notching his first goal in 13 games, tied it up in the second.

# Boston Bruins Out On Limb

Terry Sawchuk has picked up his marbles and gone home. We would like to have a lot of sympathy for the great Boston goaltender but from what we have been able to derive from reports received it is pretty hard to feel anything but disgust for a player who would quit his team in the midst of a terrific race for National Hockey League honors and leave them high and dry when for the first time in years and years they are something other than league doormats.

What prompted Sawchuk to do what he did is a mystery and will remain a mystery until someone finally gets in touch with the big boys and gets some sense out of him or tries to talk some sense into him. Boston coach Milt Schmidt was first puzzled, then amazed and now slightly angry. So angry in fact that he slapped a suspension on his missing maul ticket and the suspension will stick until the Bruins lift it. It could be forever if Terry doesn't come through with some sort of explanation.

As we said before we would like to feel sorry for Terry, but we can't. We couldn't feel the slightest sympathy for any player who would let down his hardworking teammates and the Boston owners and management at a time when they need him so much. Terry owes a certain amount of allegiance to, his coach and employers and we think especially to his teammates who may well be deprived of a lot of glory and a beautiful payday by his inconsiderate action.

Boston fandom will not take kindly to Terry's action. Sports fans in Beantown have been the subject of some stinging criticism from a goodly number of professional athletes for their unfair attitude towards their target of the day. If they can be rough when there is little reason for it we wouldn't want to be in Terry's shoes for Sawchuk has given them plenty reason to be a little hot under the collar. If he ever plays another game at Boston Garden he had better come equipped with exceedingly thick ear muffs.

Terry will have to have an exceptionally good reason to offer for his disappearance when and if he does return. The reason he would want to quit hockey could be emotional or physical, maybe a doctor could tell us. Only Terry knows why he quit without giving any explanation whatever.

The Bruins are now in a fix. Possibly they can get into the playoffs without Sawchuk. Norm Defelice showed he could stand up reasonably well to N.H.L. hockey when Terry was out last month with a blood disease. If he doesn't Bruins could possibly get the services of Harry Lumley from Char-

Neal, product of the Brooklyn farm system, hit 287 in his first year in the majors after being called up from Montreal of the International League. The 26-year-old is a likely candidate for second base.
