

# Georgetown Resources Group Sees Need Of Area Report

GEORGETOWN — The recently released report compiled by the Canadian-United management consultant firm of A. H. Baber & Co. Limited of Toronto, formerly Unicom of Canada Limited, dealing with factors influencing the development of Prince County, formed the basis for discussion at a meeting of the Georgetown Resources Development Group recently.

The meeting was held in St. David's church hall and presided over by the chairman, Temple MacDonald.

Attending the meeting were Reid Sangster, provincial director of resources and development, John MacDonell, a representative for resources development and David Smith, agricultural representative for Kings County.

At an earlier meeting J. W. Lavers had appointed, J. W. Lavers and Mrs. Clair Currie as first and second vice-presidents and Charles N. Blair as secretary.

**FOUR COMMITTEES** were set up, at the last meeting, covering four phases of development: With their persons are: tourism, Howard S. MacLean, chairman and members, J. W. Lavers and Mrs. Clair Currie; agriculture, Earl Walsh as chairman and members, Richard Curley, and Frank MacDonell; small industry, Frank Parker as chairman with Richard Curley and Mrs. Earl Walsh as members, and education, chaired by Mrs. William Murphy, with Mrs. Richard Curley and J. A. B. McConnell as members.

Many phases of the report on Prince County were touched upon, as it is felt that in many ways it can be made applicable to conditions in Kings County. When copies are available from the printers, the group will be supplying them and further study will be given to it.

The report is basically a planned program to reach 10 years into the future and it is felt that what can be done or will be done in Prince County, can be done in Kings.

**EMILIA REPORT HERE**

If efforts now underway are successful in having Kings County designated as an underdeveloped area, as efforts are being made to have the whole Atlantic area as underdeveloped, then a similar report, based on a survey of Kings will no doubt be compiled, it was felt.

Tourism, agriculture, fisheries, education, small industries and many other fields of development and action were discussed by the Georgetown group and the discussion, which was at times animated and argumentative, resulted in the group, as a whole, receiving much worthwhile and thought-provoking information.

Mr. Curley, during the discussion of agricultural and forestry problems, informed the group that the province is this year experiencing from the Dairy Industry an increase or net gain amounting to at least 25 per cent over last year.

A discussion took place regarding education and some of the phases discussed were the minimum age for workers in industry, vocational school entry qualifications, and the lack of training available for young people of school age, and the fact that a low IQ, are unable to continue academic courses and at the same time are unable to qualify to take vocational training.

This it was felt was a serious problem.

The absence in this province of schools of agriculture and fisheries was mentioned and it was felt that if it were not practical at least some educational courses in those fields should be taught in our present school system.

The group plans on making the study of credit union work one of the major efforts of the educational committee as it is felt this is an important segment of any community betterment plan.

**KENSINGTON** — Hon. Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, was guest speaker at the general meeting of the Kensington Area Board of Trade, held at Sverd's Inn on Wednesday evening.

Dr. Dewar, as delegate from the P.E.I. branch of the Canadian Parliamentary Association, attended last year's Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference at Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, South East Asia. He gave an informative talk on his experiences illustrated with a series of colored slides. Forty different parts of the commonwealth were represented at the conference by men of many nationalities and colors, but all reports with one exception were given in English, the exception being a part of his report given in French, by a Canadian.

Examples of architecture shown in the slides ranged from the very modern parliamentary buildings in which the conference was held to Modern mosques and Hindu and Buddhist temples, and Dr. Dewar also showed the Presbyterian Church where he attended a worship service, and said there is great religious tolerance. St. Francis Xavier is highly esteemed, he said.

**AGRICULTURE**

Views on the agricultural scene showed rice fields, tea and rubber plantations. An abundance of fruit is grown and fish is also an important part of the diet of the people.

The speaker noted that the people in a mixture of nationalities seem to get along well in the framework of a democratic government. Malaysia, a union of states, elects a Sultan in each state and a King of Malaysia.
