

**Another Tale of Shipwreck and Death on the Coast of Newfoundland.**

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 23.—The Government of Newfoundland has just received a despatch from the Bay of Islands from Capt. George Shepherd, commander of a relief party sent off some weeks ago by the Newfoundland authorities in search of the crew of the schooner Arabella, which had been discovered capsized some ten miles off the Bay. The result of the exploration of the search party was that the capsized schooner proved to be the Arabella, of St. John's Nfld. She was on a voyage from Chateau, Labrador, with part of a cargo of herring, and was bound for the Bay of Islands to complete her fare. In one of those terrific gales that have recently swept the west coast of Newfoundland and strewn miles of its strand with dead bodies and floating wreckage, the Arabella was thrown on her beam ends. The squall that capsized her must have been sudden, as no attempt to cut away her spars to ease the vessel was discernible. One corpse only was found on board the ill-fated schr. It was identified as the body of one Thomas Parsons. The schooner's boat was gone and the remainder of the crew and one passenger, as has since been ascertained, struck out for the shore, but never reached it. But with a number of persons on board was seen by people on shore heading in the direction of Port-au-Port, but Captain Shepherd says in his despatch that it was utterly impossible for any open boat to live while passing over the shoals and reefs that lie between the position of the schooner when abandoned by her crew and the harbor of Port-au-Port. Captain Shepherd and his party spent seven days in making a diligent search along the neighboring coast, examining every creek and receding cove where a boat was likely to effect a landing, but the search proved completely unavailing. In all human probability the once living freight carried by the Arabella has become a wholesale sacrifice to the remorseless fury of the tempest.

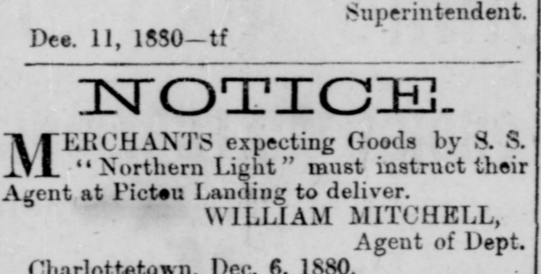
