Monsignor G. J. McLellan, V.G. of Summerside, delivered an inspiring and instructive sermon on the dignity, responsibilities and spiritual character of the priest. Present in the sanctuary were Rev. W. J. MacDonald, parish priest, Rev. B. V. MacDonald, St. Peter's, and Rev. H. J. Croken, Cardigan.

At the conclusion of the Mass, Father MacDonald was presented with a lovely gift and an accompanying address by Mr. Daniel MacLellan, Dr. Gros Marsh, and Felix Walker, St. Georges, on behalf of the parishoners of the parish. Father MacDonald fittingly expressed his appreciation for the gift, and went on to thank all those, his family, parish priest, his relatives and friends, who in any way had assisted him in attaining to the holy priesthood. Following this he gave his blessing to his family and to the large congregation present.

In the afternoon Father MacDonald celebrated benediction, assisted by Rev. David Walsh of the Bathurst diocese as deacon, and Rev. George McCormac, St. Andrew's as sub-deacon. The choir rendered the hymns "O Salutaris" and "Tantum Ergo."
