FROM ICE AND HURRICANE.—Several ocean steamers sought refuge in Halifax harbor between Saturday and Monday last. Their captains tell stories of rough weather and consequent hardships. The captain of one of the steamers reports passing an iceberg on the Newfoundland coast 800 feet high, three quarters of a mile long, and which was visible for fourteen miles.

THE LUCKY MAN.—F. W. Stevens, of New York City, makes the nearest guess to Nellie Bly's time around the world. His guess was 72 days, 6 hrs., 11 min., 14 2-5 secs. Mr. Stevens is, therefore, awarded the free trip across the Atlantic and return, with a week in London and a week in Paris, all at the New York World's expense.

NELLIE BLY'S RIVAL.—Advice from New York state that Miss Bland, who tried to beat Nellie Bly in her trip around the world, arrived from Europe on the 30th ult. The time of her journey was 77 days 16 hours, 48 minutes. Miss Bland started from New York for San Francisco ten hours after Miss Bly had sailed for Europe. Failure to connect with a fast steamer at Havre greatly delayed her.

TRURO CIVIC ELECTIONS.—Below will be found the result of the Truro civic elections held on the 4th: For mayor, Dr. D. H. Muir was elected by 35 majority over Richard Craig. Ward one, L. G. Grove, by acclamation; ward two, W. E. Bligh, by acclamation; ward three, George J. McLeod, by 26 majority over Wm. Craig. The mayoralty and ward three fights were exceedingly bitter and exciting, both sides expecting victory.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The Summerside Farmer says: On Monday, the 27th ult., about 9 p. m., the residence of Robert Carr, Esq., of North Tryon, was burned to the ground. The fire is supposed to have originated up stairs from a defective fire, and the family barely escaped with their lives. Mr. Carr had been laid aside for some time with inflammation of the lungs, and when the fire started his wife carried him to the nearest house on her back, after which she rescued her two small children and placed them outside on the woodpile. Most of the furniture was saved. No insurance.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.—On Tuesday evening the above Society reassembled for the first time since the public rendering of the "May Queen." Twelve new members have recently been elected, and the society is now very well established. Work was commenced on Haydn's grand oratorio of the "Creation," and a very satisfactory practice was held. The orchestra members were present, and played the beautiful instrumental portions of the oratorio. As Mr. Vinnicombe is so kindly assisting the good work of the Philharmonic in improving the musical taste of the city, we hope that he may be rewarded with a bumper house at his coming concert.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Weldon, of St. John, introduced a bill to incorporate the Shore Line Railway Bridge Company.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau resumed the debate on Mr. Wilson's motion for the repeal of the Franchise Act. He pointed out the necessity of the Dominion controlling its own electoral lists, and if, as in his opinion was the case, it was too costly to have a revision every year, he thought a plan could be devised whereby changes of electorates could be provided for without annual revision.

Members of the Opposition then continued to debate until 11 o'clock, when, at the suggestion of Mr. Laurier, it was adjourned.

The bill to be introduced by the Minister of Justice to further amend the criminal law, is a measure designed to authorize the lash as a punishment for certain abominable offences.

The Dual Language Question.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

As Wednesday next, the day fixed for the discussion of Dalton McCarthy's bill to abolish the language system in the Northwest draws near, public interest in the question increases. Nicholas Flood Davit, M. P., for Assiniboia, gives notice that on the motion for the second reading of McCarthy's bill, he will move "That the said bill be not read a second time, but that whereas the Northwest Territories Act with the 110th clause included was passed before a large population had entered the country it is expedient that the Legislative Assembly of the territories be authorized to declare whether or not the French language shall continue as one of the official languages, and that no change shall be made until there has been an appeal to the electors."

A Disastrous Explosion.

LONDON, Feb. 6.

An explosion occurred in a colliery at Abershan, in Monmouthshire, 10 miles northwest of Newport, and 300 miners were imprisoned, and for several hours no communication could be had with them. An opening was finally effected, and at noon 200 hundred of them had been rescued. Rescuing parties are still searching for those remaining in the mine. Up to four o'clock this afternoon forty bodies had been taken from the mine. Fifty miners are still imprisoned. It is not known whether they are alive or dead.

A Clerical Sensation.

LONDON, Feb. 6.

A sensation has been caused in clerical circles by the Archbishop of Canterbury allowing the counsel for Dr. King, Bishop of Lincoln, charged with ritualistic practices, to re-argue the propriety of the use of lighted candles on the communion table, before the Privy Council, although such practices for a long time have been pronounced illegal.

A New Idea.

LONDON, Feb. 6.

Alfred Thomas, Home Rule member of the House of Commons for the east division of Glamorganshire, will at the coming session move an amendment to the Queen's Speech, that the affairs of Wales ought to be administered by a special department, presided over by a minister acquainted with Welsh national affairs.

Artillery Meeting.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Military Association was held to-day. Gen. Middleton was re-elected President. In an address to the meeting the Governor General urged that country detachments should visit Halifax to examine the newest style of guns in the Imperial service.

Penny Postage.

MONTREAL, Feb. 6.

The French Chamber of Commerce of this city has passed a resolution favoring a penny postage for the whole Empire, and will petition Parliament on the subject before the motion of Imperial Federation is discussed.

Preparing for a Strike.

LONDON, Feb. 6.

The committee of the dock laborer's union is making arrangements for a general strike Monday. Many of the men are averse to striking again, and much discontent prevails.

Sad State of Affairs.

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 6.

The influenza is increasing here and causing so many deaths that sufficient numbers of hearses are not available to carry the bodies of the dead to the cemeteries.
