CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. NORTH: K86, Q104, A6, Q1032. WEST: Q92, 953, KJ543, K7. EAST: 10753, A862, Q8, 654. SOUTH: A4, K7, 10972, AJ98. The bidding: 1 Pass, 2 Pass, 3NT.

Opening lead—four of diamonds. There is no question that some hands are more difficult to play than others. Here is one to test the mettle of any player. For a true test, the play should be planned without looking at the East-West cards. A diamond is opened and unless declarer climbs up with the ace at trick one he is doomed to defeat. Thus, if the diamond is ducked, East wins with the queen and returns the eight. Declarer can get nowhere without eventually tackling the club suit, and when he does, West defeats him. The reason declarer goes up with the ace is that it is obvious West cannot have K-Q-J or he would have opened the king. Hence East must have at least one honor and the suit is bound to be blocked if West had five diamonds, while if West had four diamonds nothing can be gained by ducking. To play at trick two, whether to tackle hearts or clubs first, also has only one answer. A club honor should be led and finessed. First, let's examine the effect of the club play in the actual hand. West wins, but can do no better than cash two diamonds. Eventually, East makes the ace of hearts and declarer makes nine tricks. Now as to why the club play is correct: 1. If West has both ace of hearts and king of clubs, the contract cannot be made. This case is therefore dismissed from consideration. 2. If West has neither ace of hearts nor king of clubs, the contract will make regardless of which suit is played first. This case is of no concern. 3. If West has only the ace of hearts, finessing the club wins the hand, though it is granted the heart play first also succeeds. 4. If West has only the king of clubs, finessing the club at once is absolutely essential to make the contract. Conclusion: The club play at trick two can win the hand but cannot be the cause of losing it. The heart play first can lose the hand.

Speculate On Links In Anti-American Outbreaks

Bitter demonstrations in Venezuela, Algiers, Paris and Lebanon tell a story of the trials that beset the United States. These perhaps are the inevitable companions of world leadership. Is there a direct connection between these incidents? Particularly unhappy is the lot of Richard Nixon, the touring vice-president of the U.S., now that he has once again been stoned and spat upon, this time in Caracas. DEEP RESENTMENTS. This new indignity undoubtedly has a connection with earlier attacks on Nixon during his South American tour, and it also seems obvious that Communists played a part. But there are other causes. Venezuelans have resented restrictions imposed by the U.S. on oil imports from their country. And although Venezuela owes much wealth to U.S. investment, the common folk do not always share in its benefits. The inflamed youths attacking Nixon also jeered about U.S. racial problems. Another item poisoning the minds of Venezuelans — however unjustly — against Americans is the fact that their ousted dictator, Marcos Perez Jimenez, now is living in luxury in the U.S. REASONS DIFFER. China Keeps Hands Off Any Power Struggle In Kremlin

Utterances of Chinese leaders and editorials in the Peiping press— which reflect government policy—provide no grounds for assuming the Communists here are intervening in a Soviet battle for control, if any. 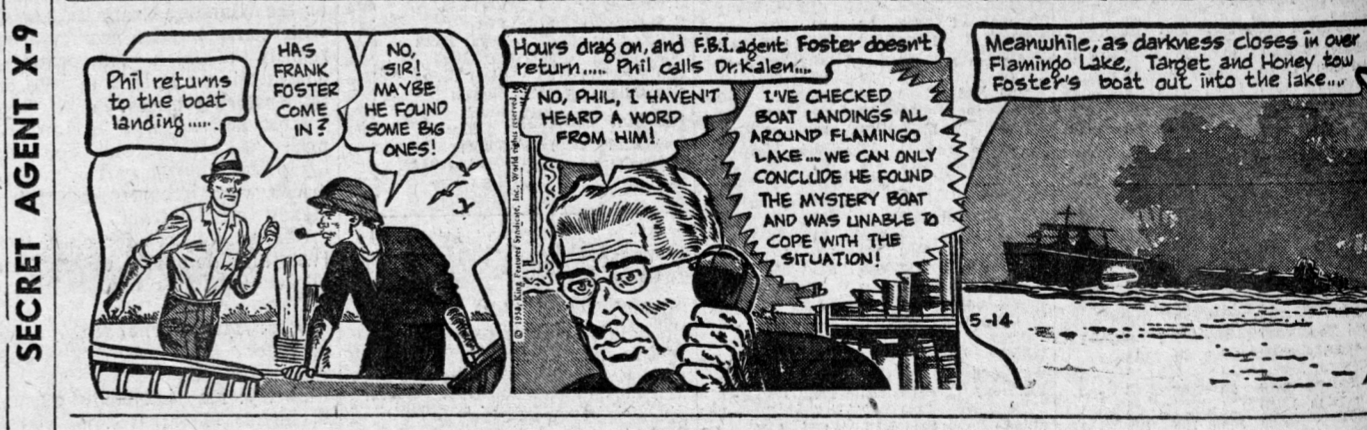
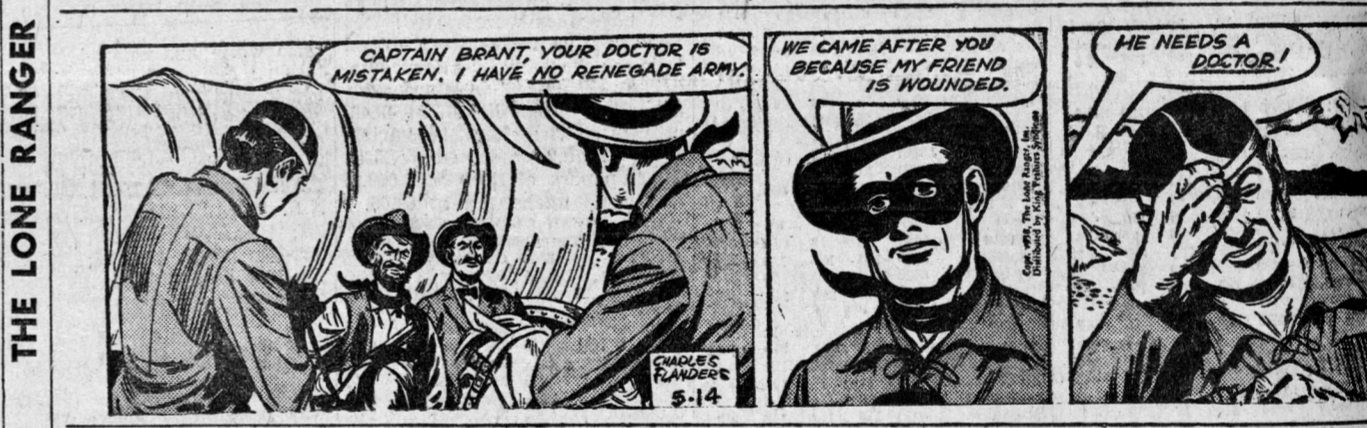
