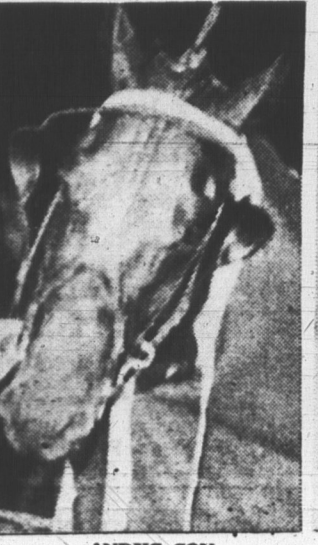

Roach Draws Rail

The 1966 Gold Cup and Saucer Pace is already drawing raves across the Island as the big question seems to be "can Andy's Son defeat this year's field of promising speedsters?"

Many race fans think that last year's winner Andy's Son will have his hands filled but his owners Eric and Harry Wheby and driver Jimmy Moore figure he will again triumph in this year's great event. Andy's Son will leave the gate from the four spot on Friday night.

Borderview Roy owned by Jim Ferguson, Sydney N.S., and driven by D. Coadic will leave from the two spot Friday night and this six year old bay horse defeated Andy's Son in their last meeting at Brunswick Downs two weeks ago. His fastest mile this year is 2:05.

Jim Fashion owned, trained and driven by James "Roach" MacGregor, Charlottetown, has drawn the rail spot, and this will make "Big Jim" the horse to beat on Friday night.

Onaway owned by R. R. Driscoll of Truro, N.S., and driven by Frank Daniels will leave from the three spot, and this tough speedster will be going all out to put the Gold Cup and Saucer on his victory list.

Onaway won a heat of the Invitational Pace on Monday afternoon at the Charlottetown track in the time of 2:07.4 and must be given a second look before making a trip to the parimutuals.

Leaving from the five spot will be Comte Richelieu who paced a mile in 2:04.4 at Brunswick Downs three weeks and also won a heat of Monday's Evening Patriot Invitational. Owner and driver Milton Downey will certainly be going all out to grab a win in Friday's glowing annual event.

Miriamichi Fred owned by R. Tingley of Sackville, N.B., and driven by Clark Smith will leave from the outside and he could also pull out a win.

The sensational pacer Yankee Blaze co-holder of the fastest mile paced on the Island this year will trail out Jim Fashion and he will certainly be backed heavily by local race fans. On Monday night at the Charlottetown track this great pacer toured the oval in a blistering 2:05 and Emma "Cowboy" Bernard will be trying his hardest to grab a win for owners Dawson and Craig of Charlottetown.

Leaving from the tough eighth spot is Yankee Timber a full brother to Yankee Blaze and a black horse who is capable of pacing a mile in 2:06 or better every trip out. The black speedster is owned by Jack Brown of Charlottetown and driven by Joe Smallwood.

Also transacted later on the evening at the races was the draw for the horses that were to represent the Gold Cup and Saucer Girls. Rosemary Brown Linden Hanover (E. Reeves) 5.3 probably was the happiest of the group for a trio of reasons. She drew last of the eight and picked the favored Andy's Son. Last year she drew Dee's Boy only to see her representative drawn on the eve of the race.

Last year's Miss Gold Cup and Saucer, Trudy Calbeck drew Miriamichi Fred and the other six lovelies in the annual pageant drew as follows: Carol Foster - Comte Richelieu; Dorna Vessey - Onaway; Patty Dappin - Jim Fashion; Paulette Burke - Yankee Blaze; Veda Waller - Borderview Roy; Cheryl Paquet - Yankee Timber.

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Upset Wins, Good Pays Highlight Harness Action

Good pays were the rule rather than the exception at the Charlottetown Driving Park as the sixth racing card of Old Home Week was run off.

Rio Grande got the night off to a fine start as the J.S. Schurman owned gelding got a fine drive from G. Chappell and had the field crossed the wire in the curl in raris. Favorites, Miss Woodstock and Susan's Birthday timed their finishes a bit late and finished in third and second places respectively.

Then Kim Sue dashes to the wire in front of the rest in the second dash and paid a handsome \$89.90 in the first double. The favorites came back though in the fifth dash but bettors has started to play the longshots by this time and the 1-2 finish of Woodstock paid \$29.70 in the exacto feature.

The third dash of the evening was another shocker as Irene Mir took her second consecutive win at the Park and paid \$47.10, \$11.50 and \$6.80 across the board. As expected Wayne's Pride came up with the place finish and the combination of the pari-mutuals \$68.80. This class too figured in another feature event as it was the second half of the second double.

Ohio's Orphan, after having finished third in the second dash came on to win the sixth and combined with the winner of the seventh, Payne's Pride to pay \$13.80 in the second double.

Races four and eight were the only tame ones of the evening as far as betting went but only because there were no features. Armond's Buddy, after placing second the first time out came on with a big stretch drive to shade out the winner of the first dash Amy Thorpe.

A wet track, a cool evening and well classified fields. What more could the longshot betters and hunch players ask for? Not much.

The afternoon card at the Charlottetown Driving Park featured almost the same highlights as all the others have this week, good pays.

Rustico Bay took top honors in the opening dash and combined with Real Spirit, winner of the second dash to pay \$39.90 in the first double. The Quinella combination of Jimmy Gallon, who ran away with the race and Miss Tom Scott was good for \$11.50 but this same class made for the best pay of the afternoon later in the card. With Jimmy Gallon barred from the betting in the seventh dash Triflite, who had finished sixth first time out, placed and was the winning bet in the second half of the double. Ottawa Riders Beat Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders scored a converted touchdown in both the second and third quarters after picking up a first-quarter single and defeated Montreal Alouettes 15-3 in an Eastern Football conference game here Wednesday night.

The victory moved the Rough Riders into sole possession of first place in the Eastern Conference with six points. They are undefeated in three starts this season.

The loss was Montreal's second in three games this year and left them in third place with two points.

A shirt-sleeved crowd of 22,563 watched the game.

Earl Ford, Watkins and fullback Jim Dillard scored the Ottawa touchdowns. Tackle Moe Raching converted both touchdowns and added a single on a wide field goal attempt in the first quarter.

Flanker Peter Kempf picked up Montreal's three points with a field goal in the third quarter.

GOT 17 FIRST DOWNS
The Rough Riders picked up 17 first downs to 13 for Montreal. Ottawa got nine first downs on passes and eight rushing, while Montreal picked up six first downs through the air, six rushing and one on a penalty.

Nicklaus, Palmer To Represent U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jack Nicklaus, the Masters and British Open titleholder, and Arnold Palmer, the season's second leading money winner, were named Wednesday to represent the United States in the international Canada Cup matches at Tokyo, Nov. 10.

In picking the game's two muscle men, the special committee of the Japanese organizers passed over the year's No. 1 golfer, Bill Casper, winner of the U.S. Open and three other tournaments, money-winning leader and pace-setter in scoring averages.

The selection is left entirely to the host country. A list of U.S. players is submitted by the Professional Golfers' Association and from this list is picked the two American player the hosts would most prefer to see.

This is the fourth appearance in the matches for the 26-year-old Nicklaus, who won the individual title at Paris in 1963 and Hawaii in 1964, and the fifth for Palmer, who has shared in four team prizes but never won the individual crown.

SHARE VICTORY
Palmer shared the Canada Cup team victory with Nicklaus in 1963 and 1964 and with Sam Snead in Ireland in 1960 and Buenos Aires in 1962.

Nicklaus paired with the late Tony Lama last year in Madrid where the individual title was won by Gary Player of South Africa and the team prize by Player and Harold Henning.

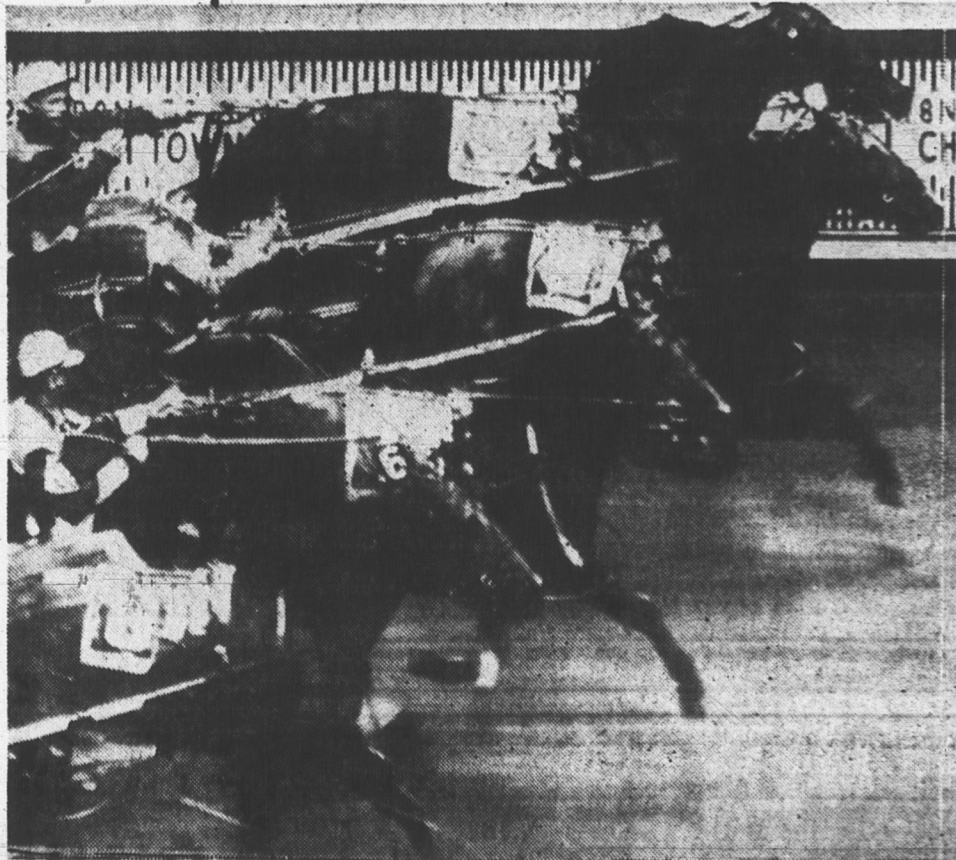
Player and Henning again will represent South Africa and will compete against 37 other teams from throughout the world. Japan's representatives will be Hideyo Sugimoto and Mitsutaka Kono.

The event will be played over the Yomiuri Country Club course.

The last time the tournament was staged in Japan, the Japanese monopolized honors. Torakichi (Pete) Nakamura outplayed Sam Snead and Jimmy Demaret for the individual championship and teamed with Koichi Ono for the team crown.
