Ferry Service Back In Action

Ferry service from Prince Edward Island to the mainland was restored yesterday morning with quiet order after five days of uncertainty whether striking workers would resume operation of the CNR vessels between Borden, P.E.I. and Cape Tormentine.

The ferry Confederation tied up along with three other boats since the nation wide rail strike started Friday, slipped out of Borden without incident at 6:30 a.m. yesterday and unloaded nine or 10 cars at Cape Tormentine.

A CNR spokesman in Moncton said there were no demonstrations by union members at either terminal and the Confederation left New Brunswick side on schedule at 7:30 a.m. with 6-10 vehicles.

The ferry Prince Edward Island departed from Borden on time at 8 a.m. and a railway spokesman there said ticket sellers, vehicle handlers and other workers were performing their duties in an orderly fashion.

Another ferry, the Abegweit, picked up her schedule at 10 a.m. yesterday.

MUST BELIEVE IN PEACE

International President Addresses Island Lions

"Peace will not be achieved by government, it will not be achieved by violence in the streets — peace will be attained first in the hearts of men," Edward Lindsay, Lawrenceburg, Tennessee, president of Lions International told about 200 members of Island Lions clubs at the luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Lindsay told those attending "we must believe that peace can and will be attained, for if we do not believe peace is attainable then war is inevitable."

He continued "if peace is to be attained in our lifetime, we must turn over the search for peace to the young people who are the future of the world's nations and hope that in our late years we will see a peaceful world."

Mr. Lindsay pointed out that there are 800,000 Lions in 135 countries of the world, and added that this comprises a strong force working for peace. Dealing with the Lions International 50th anniversary project, an essay competition for young people he noted: the peace essay contest is open to any young person between the ages of 14 and 22 in any one of the 135 countries where Lions Clubs are operating. "Through the contest," President Lindsay said "Lions hope to stimulate young people to search and strive toward the goal of a peaceful world."

He also outlined the method on which the contest will be judged. All entries are first judged on a local club level, the winning essays from the club competition will then be judged on a district level and by a process of elimination through a multiple district, world geographical level and an international level until July of 1967 when the winner will be named by a panel of international judges headed by Dwight D. Eisenhower, at the 50th anniversary convention in Chicago.

"The winner of the contest," Mr. Lindsay said, "will receive \$25,000 and the winners in each of the geographical divisions will receive \$1000 and a trip to Chicago for the 50th annual convention."

Mr. Lindsay, who was elected president of Lions International in July also outlined briefly his tour of Canada, which he began in mid-August, which will kick-off a world wide tour that will see him visit Lions Clubs in about 100 countries.

He was accompanied to Charlottetown by his wife Virginia. Prem. Alex Campbell speaking briefly at yesterday's luncheon welcomed President Lindsay to the province and congratulated Lions International on the efforts being made through the "Search for Peace" contest.

Mayor Walter Cor who was on hand to extend a welcome from the City of Charlottetown, echoed Premier Campbell's sentiments on the contest.

W. J. Brown, Charlottetown, district governor of Lions for New Brunswick and P.E.I. was the chairman for yesterday's luncheon meeting.

During the proceedings Mr. Lindsay presented service medals, one of the highest awards of Lions International, to Lt. Governor W. J. MacDonald and to Premier A. B. Campbell in recognition of the contribution they had made to Lionism. A 50th anniversary medal was presented to Mayor Walter Cor.

Premier Campbell on behalf of the province presented Mr. and Mrs. Lindsay with a pair of birdseye maple bookends and a presentation was also made to Mr. and Mrs. Lindsay on behalf of the ten Island Lions Clubs.

The department will close the Station at Frobiisher Bay, N.W.T. in mid-1967. Stations at Whitehorse, Y.T., and Churchill, Man., will be closed in late 1967 or 1968. Two others at Coverdale, N.B., and Ladner, B.C., will be closed in late 1970 or early 1971.

About 500 service personnel and 200 civilian employees will be affected. Servicemen will be reassigned and the department said it will "make every effort to provide alternative employment" for civilian employees.
