CHOLERA.

A letter received by a gentleman in Salem, presents the following distressing picture of New Orleans:

New Orleans, November 2.

There are now no less than three epidemics raging in this city, viz. Cold Plague, Yellow Fever, and the Cholera. There are new cases almost every moment, and from a hundred and seventy five to two hundred deaths every day. Business is nearly at a stand. A very large number of Irish draymen have fallen victims, and a large number of the slaveholders will not allow their slaves to work, consequently there are but very few drays running, and the streets appear almost deserted, except by hearse and mourners. It may in truth be said that man goeth to his long home, and mourners go about the streets. If we go into the streets, we see scarcely any thing else, but tar barrels burning at the corners, and funeral passing to and from the burying grounds. A short time since there was an excitement about the election, but now we hear of nothing but sickness and death. The city at this time does not contain more than forty thousand persons. The old inhabitants say that the city has not been so dirty for thirty years before.

An endorsement on a paper, dated Friday evening, Nov. 23, states that the Cholera had diminished, and that the number of cases that day would not exceed 200. It is added that the burials during that week would amount to about 1200, three quarters of Cholera, and the balance of Yellow Fever.
