### U.S. May Establish Jet Fighter Base On Formosa

By GARDNER L. BRIDGE WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States may nail down its determination to hold Formosa against any Red Chinese "liberation" plans by establishing an American base of jet fighter planes and U.S. marine units there.

A final decision on the move may await the return from Formosa this weekend of Assistant Secretary Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff.

Robertson and Radford flew to Taipei last week for a round of conferences with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and other Chinese Nationalist leaders who are bitterly opposed to any cease-fire bartering between Washington and the Chinese Communists.

The base now contemplated would be more of a symbol of American commitments than a big military installation, but U.S. officials feel its presence would have the dual effect of reassuring Chiang's Nationalists and offsetting Red propaganda that the U.S. does not intend to back up its pledges in Asia.

### Justice Dept. Opposes Ruling Of Quebec Courts

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government says provincial legislatures have no constitutional power to prohibit freedom of religious worship.

It also contends that three Quebec provincial police officers who broke up a meeting of Jehovah's witnesses in Chapeau, Que., in September, 1949, can claim no defence under the Magistrate's Privilege Act of Quebec.

This argument will be advanced by the justice department in the Supreme Court appeal of Eymier Chapat, self-styled Jehovah's witness evangelist, scheduled to be heard next week. Written argument supporting the government's stand was submitted to the court Thursday.

Chapat is appealing a judgment of the Quebec courts dismissing his claim for \$5,000 damages from the provincial policemen for alleged violation of religious freedom, his rights as a citizen and seizure of a Bible and other articles.

The officers broke up a Bible session attended by about 35 persons in Chapat's home. They testified Chapat had pamphlets containing "seditious libel" and was "creating animosity and hate between different classes of society."

The lower courts upheld their statement that they were acting in good faith on orders from superiors and were entitled to protection afforded under the Magistrate's Privilege Act.

The federal argument will be opposed by the Quebec government, which contends the provinces have jurisdiction equal to that of Parliament in maintaining law and order within provincial boundaries.

Canadian Girl Title Winner ROCHESTER, N.Y., (CP)—A 16-year-old Canadian girl Saturday won the women's all-round title in the American Athletic Union gymnastic championships.

Ernestine Russell of Windsor Ont., Canadian woman gymnastic champion, won all four events in the all-round competition, an AAU record.

She won the free calisthenics, the side horse vault, the balance beam, and the uneven parallel bars.

It was the first time any competitor had ever won all four titles in the all-round events. Her total of 227.2 points was far ahead of her nearest rival, Arendine Ostendorp of New York who had 199.4.
