JEROME RANAHAH

Kinkora and surrounding districts lost an outstanding citizen in the sudden passing of Jerome Ranahan on December 28.

Although he had suffered a heart attack the previous September, he had recovered sufficiently well to get back to his normal cheerful self. However, Monday evening resting after dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clair Greenan, Charlottetown he suffered a severe heart attack and quietly passed away a short time later.

He was born at Kinkora on January 28, 1876, the son of John Ranahan and Bridget Askin. Being one of a large family and an equally large farm, he early became inured to hard labor and responsibility.

In 1904, he married, Regina McCordle who predeceased him in March 1950.

In 1909, he entered the service of what is now the Canadian National Railway where he gave faithful and conscientious service until his retirement in 1937. Retirement from the C. N. He was born at West St. Peters, 25 November, 1922, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Aeneas C. MacDonald who now reside at Georgetown.

In December, 1942, Reggie joined the army and trained at Beach Grove and Aldershot. He proceeded overseas in June, 1943, and landed in England where he underwent a short period of training before being sent to North Africa to complete training in preparation for joining the Canadian Forces in Italy. In December, 1943, during his period of training in Italy he met with an accident which almost cost him his life. He was on the dangerously ill list for more than a month, and only slight hope was entertained for his recovery. However, being of robust constitution he survived. He had been hospitalized for 18 months, during which time it was found necessary to remove his left eye.

After his discharge from military hospital he spent several months with his parents, who then resided at West St. Peters. He went to Nova Scotia, and later moved to Toronto, where several of his brothers and sisters resided.

Besides his parents the following six brothers and four sisters remain: Cecil in New Glasgow, N. S.; Merlin, London, Ont.; Peter, who gave one year's service in Korea with the R.C.R., now with the Royal Canadian Regiment Petawawa; Raymond, Greenwood, N.
