Provincial Committee Has Tips For Expo '67 Lodging

The Provincial Women's Committee for Expo '67 hopes that you have already made arrangements for purchase of your passports for this World Exhibition in Montreal. If so, we know that you are probably wondering about suitable accommodations, particularly if you are planning on taking your whole family along.

We have heard rumors that accommodations will be extremely difficult to find, and indeed, that all available places are already booked. Remembering the experience of a year or so ago in our own province, when unfounded rumors were rife that no accommodations were available anywhere on "The Island", we would imagine that our people would be more liable to take present rumors about Expo with the proverbial "grain of salt". Your Provincial Women's Committee has received assurance from Monica Muzan of the National Advisory Committee that, and we quote, "be assured that you will find accommodations and comfortable beds" unquote.

In order to ensure that there will be accommodations for all visitors, Expo has set up its own official housing bureau, called Logexpo, which is a strictly non-profit organization formed for the sole purpose of providing the best possible reservation service for anyone attending this gigantic exhibition. Logexpo has made a complete survey of all available types of accommodations, both in and around Montreal, and have listings of all available places, such as, hotels, motels, rooming houses, apartment houses, private homes, colleges, universities, convents and other institutions. There will also be camping and trailer sites.

The daily average price range for hotels and motels is between \$2.00 and \$25.00 for a single room, depending upon locality and quality. Suites in apartment-
