Will Recommend
Change In Rules

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes are to recommend three changes in football rules during a pre-Grey Cup meeting of football executives at Vancouver.

General manager Gorman Kennedy said they are designed to open up the game and make it more exciting.

The club is to suggest the following changes:

1. Give punt receivers 10 yards leeway instead of five as at present.
2. Permit unlimited blocking by linemen and eliminate one halfback blocking.
3. Move the scrimmage marks 20 yards from the sidelines instead of 10 yards.

Commenting on the proposed changes, Kennedy said: "With 10 yards for the punt receiver after making a catch, we feel that you will see more lateral pass-

The sudden burst of enthusiasm followed Edmonton Eskimos' upset 30-7 victory over Winnipeg Blue Bomber at Winnipeg Wednesday night, just four days after the Bombers knocked over the Eskimos by a similar score in the opening game of the series.

Coach 'Pop' Ivy
Reads Riot Act
To His Players

CHICAGO (AP)—Coach Frank Ivy of Chicago Cardinals has let his patience run out—he's reading the riot act to his players.

The usually easy-going coach is genuinely angry over the performance of his team, which has lost three games and tied one in its last four starts for a 2-5-1 record.

"It's a shame for kids to perform like we have lately," said Ivy, who is just now beginning to know how it feels to be a losing coach.

Ivy, a former end with the Cards in their post-war heyday, was an assistant to Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma when the Sooners were unbeaten for 31 straight games. At Edmonton, his Eskimos won the Grey Cup three times.

"Some of our fellows are giving 100-per-cent effort all the time," he said in trying to analyze the Cardinals' plight. "Some are giving 90 per cent and some 75 per cent. With a young team like ours, with so many rookies, we should be getting better each week. Instead we're going downhill."
