### Centennial Youth Chorus Performs At Theatre Sunday

Confederation Centre Theatre this Sunday evening will see the Centennial Choir perform under the direction of Christopher Glehill.

The Island Centennial Youth Chorus was formed in the fall of 1963 and consists of 20 picked voices from about 30 junior high schools within 20 miles of Charlottetown.

It will be taking part in a program of songs at the 9 o'clock evening concert. Canadians singing in the Centennial Choir perform under the direction of Christopher Glehill, a harpischoridist, and a musician of demonstrated worth, having won the Royal William scholarship and the Eric Rolinson prize in the examination for Association in the Royal Canadian College of Organists.

He also collects Island folk songs, now numbering about 30. One of them, the Gataue Song, is sung each year at Candemia in Tracadie on the occasion of the collecting of garments and food for the poor.

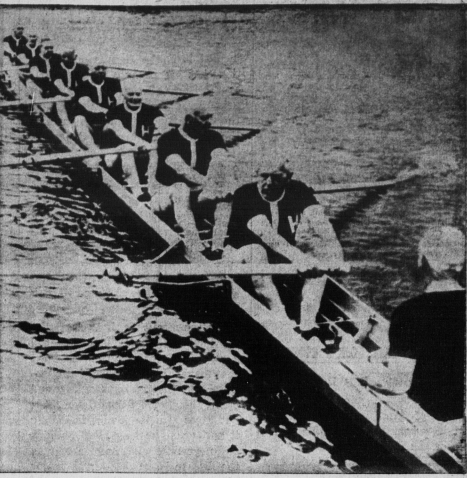
The Convocation exercises will be held at the Royal Albert Hotel, Charlottetown, on Sunday, July 26, at 11:30 a.m.

### 1914 CREW ROWS AGAIN
