## South Viet Nam Strongman Is Seen Sliding Into Crisis

SAIGON (AP) — Premier Nguyen Cao Ky is sliding into his first major government crisis beset by the twin problems that plagued Ngo Dinh Diem and Lt.-Gen. Nguyen Khanh, the two previous strongmen in South Viet Nam.

How can he keep extremists off the streets and at the same time retain the full backing of the all-powerful military junta? His survival will depend upon a judicious use of power, persuasion and tact.

For a time the powerful backing of the United States that Ky enjoys seemed sufficient to shield him from the vagaries of local politics. But in this crisis, the United States can only stand self-consciously aside, hopeful that the vague anti-American overtones of recent demonstrations don't increase.

Ky and the handful of generals who share the pinnacle of power in Viet Nam brought much of the trouble upon themselves. They exposed a crack in the ruling group by expelling one of

tors took to the streets in Saigon, at Da Nang and at the Buddhist centre of Hue.  
What does the opposition want? Premier Ky, as were his predecessors, must be puzzled. The Buddhists say they desire a civilian government and the implementation of a vague "four-point" program, including the return to Viet Nam of all ousted generals.

The cry has been raised for early general elections in a country where at least as many people are under the control of the Communists as are under the control of the government.

Some agitators are complaining about U.S. bases along the coast and in the mountains, suggesting that the government has sold out to the U.S.

So far Ky has concentrated on speeches calling for public unity. U.S. authorities would like him to take a firm stand against the public demonstrations. The argument is made that the list of alleged grievances seems aimed more at creating confusion than solving anything.

One American official comment: "Where does a Buddhist end and a Communist begin?" Ky is enough of a politician to know that in modern Saigon firm action in the streets could play into the hands of the opposition by providing martyrs. He is biding his time.

Ky has attempted to mollify the opposition with the promise of earlier general elections for a civilian government. But he must know that any elections this year could hardly be representative.

## Third Printing Of Book Planned

TORONTO (CP) — A third printing of 20,000 copies of Isabel LeBourgeois' book, The Trial of Steven Truscott, is starting immediately. Jack McClelland, president of McClelland and Stewart, said Tuesday.

The first printing of 15,000 was sold and the publishers got the 20,000 second printing off the press at Winnipeg Monday. The second printing is already covered by orders.

The book deals with the 1969 trial of a 14-year-old Clinton, Ont. boy who was found guilty of the slaying of Lynne Harper. It advances the author's theory that the boy, now serving a life sentence, was the victim of a miscarriage of justice.
