Local and Other Items.

A YOUNG MAN'S PERSONAL LETTERS

They Should not be Addressed to His Place of Business.

"A young man in business is wisest who sees to it that his personal letters do not come to his business address," writes Edward Bok in the October Ladies' Home Journal. "Aside from the technical point that he has no right to use his employer's address for social correspondence, and it is not the place for such letters, it means a freedom from distraction which is valuable to him. The receipt of social letters at business places often means their answer there, and so one evil multiplies into another. A young man's business hours should be devoted to business, and he cannot be too strict in the observance of that rule.
