Jackie Burke Wins Masters Golf Tourney

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Jackie Burke, slipped in as winner of the 20th Masters golf tournament Sunday as front-runners Ken Venturi and Cary Middlecoff collapsed in the final round.

Burke, winning his first Masters championship, shot the final round over the mighty 6,965-yard Augusta national course in 71, one under par, for a 72-hole total of 289.

Venturi, the amateur sensation from San Francisco who had led from the start, finally yielded to pressure on the last day before the eyes of some 15,000 fans. He had a last round of 80 and a 290 total just enough to save second place.

Middlecoff, four strokes behind Venturi starting the last round and apparently the only threat to a victory for the amateur, finished with a painful 77 that gave him third place at 291.

Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Lachute, Que., had a 74, his best round of the tournament, to finish with 303. He was one point ahead of Al Baiding of Toronto who also had a 74 for 304.

Burke was eight strokes out of the lead at the start of the final round.

OVER SODDEN TRACK

Landy Breaks Four-Minute Mile 4th Time Saturday

 MELBOURNE (AP)—Amazing John Landy broke the four-minute barrier for the fourth time in his last five attempts with an astonishing 3:58.8 performance on a sodden track Saturday.

Holder of the world record of 3:58, the slender 25-year-old schoolteacher appeared to be lope along until his time for the three-quarters was announced as three minutes.

Then the curly-haired, six-foot, 150-pounder lit out and blazed the last 40 yards in 58.6 to equal the world's second best time for the mile.

Landy now holds the three fastest times for the distance: 3:58 and two runs of 3:58.6. His other under-four-minute spectacular was 3:58.8 when he finished second to England's Roger Bannister

Marlies Upset Jr. Canucks

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Marlies came from behind twice Sunday to upset Junior Montreal Canadiens 3-2 in the first game of the best-of-seven eastern Canada Memorial Cup hockey final.

Defenceman Harry Neale led the winners as he scored the winning goal and assisted on the other two.

Marlboros trailed 1-0 early in the first period but it was 1-1 by the end of the period. Canadiens scored the only goal of the second, but Marlboros fired a pair of goals within two minutes and 19 seconds to win the game midway through the third period.

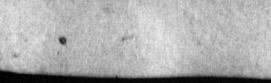
