

# Bedard Continues To Win In Pan American Games

CHICAGO (CP) — Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., eighth-ranking singles player, continued to blow down the Games' highest-seeded players by beating fifth-ranked Francisco Contreras of Mexico, 6-2, 1-6, 6-3, 6-3 in the semi-finals of the men's tennis tournament at the Pan American Games Tuesday.

Bedard Tuesday defeated second-seeded Mario Llamas of Mexico 6-2, 8-10, 3-6, 6-4, 6-4 in a four-hour struggle.

Bedard will meet top-ranked Luis Ayala of Chile in the finals. Ayala beat Jon Douglas of Santa Monica, Calif., 7-5, 6-2, 6-1 in the other semi-final match today.

Althea Gibson of New York, two-time Wimbledon champion, had no trouble in disposing of Mimi Arnold of Redwood, Calif., 6-1, 6-3 in the first of the women's semi-final matches.

**MEXICAN GIRL WINS**  
Second-ranked Yolanda Ramirez of Mexico whipped fourth-ranked Dorothy Knode, formerly of Forest Hills, N. Y., in the other women's semi-final, 4-6, 6-0, 6-1.

Bedard, bothered by a charley horse, had little trouble with Contreras in reaching the finals and assuring Canada of a silver medal at least. The Canadian broke Contreras' service twice in the final set.

The leg ailment is odd stuff to Bedard. "I get it often when I perspire freely and apply ointment periodically during matches," he said. "I've been bothered with it in five big-time tournaments and won four of them, so it isn't too much of a worry."

"I'm going to give it a good try but I don't think my chances are too bright," he said of Thursday's final with Ayala, Chile's No. 1 player and ranked among the world's top 10.

"I played him last year in the international invitation tournament in Toronto and lost 7-9, 1-6, 1-6."

# Southpaw Sandy Koufax Equals Strikeout Record

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Left-hander Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles Dodgers is co-holder today of the major league strikeout record. Yet but for a bad bunt, he might be just another pitcher.

The 23-year-old Koufax fanned 18 Giants Monday night to equal the record set by Bob Feller in 1936. After the game — Los Angeles won 5-2 — Dodger manager Walt Alton said:

"I would have taken him out if Maury Wills had bunted John Roseboro to second in the seventh inning. I was going to bring in Carl Furillo to pinch hit."

But Wills dribbled the ball in front of the plate, Roseboro was forced, and Koufax stayed in to complete a performance that had a crowd of 82,794 roaring.

"He had great stuff," said catcher Roseboro. "He kept them looking for that high, hard curve over and then he slipped his curve over. This was something I'll remember all my life."

Koufax said: "I had a real good fast ball. That's what made my curve so effective. They chased a lot of bad curves."

Dodger pitching coach Joe Becker gave this appraisal: "For sheer velocity, I think this fellow throws faster than Feller did. But Feller's fast ball moved around at little more."

Sandy's performance which also obliterated the National League strikeout mark of 17 set by Dizzy Dean in 1933, was no fluke.

**CLOSE PREVIOUSLY**  
He came within one strikeout of tying Dean's record last June 16 when he fanned 16 against Philadelphia. Last time out, also against the Phillies, he struck out 13.

His total of 31 for two consecutive games breaks another Feller record of 28 set in 1936. Sand y now 8-4 and has 130 strikeouts in 127 innings.

Was he aware he was nearing a record Tuesday night: — "Around the seventh, after I had fanned seven in a row, I knew I had quite a few. Then in the ninth, when the crowd cheered on every strike and booed when the umpire called balls—even when they were far out of the strike zone — I knew something was cooking."

# 15 Horses Will Compete In Hambletonian Today

DUQUOIN, Ill. (AP) — Rain and the threat of more rain dampened prospects Tuesday for a new speed record in the 34th renewal of harness racing's grand old classic, the \$125,204 Hambletonian.

More than half an inch of rain muddied the clay track at the Duquoin State Fairgrounds, scene of today's premier race for three-year-old trotters.

Barring additional moisture 15 horses—12 colts, a filly and a gelding—will go to the post in a bid for all-time record purse and a one-mile race record.

The record was set by last year's winner, the filly Emily's Pride, with a 1:59 4-5 clocking in a third decisive heat on the Duquoin track.

At least four colts in this year's

strong field are considered capable of a new mark on a solid track. The fastest time for a colt in the Hambletonian was Hoot Mon's 2:00 in the 1947 Hambletonian at Goshen, N.Y., a race record which stood until last year.

**BIG FAVORITE**  
Diller Hanover, a bay colt from Hall Stables, Watertown, N.Y., is a prohibitive favorite at 2-1 in official odds. Pari-mutuel betting is banned by Illinois law on a state fair track.

Sulky fans rate Diller Hanover's strongest competitors as The Silk (4-1), Circus (4-1), Lord Churney (3-1) and John A. Hanover (6-1).

Joe O'Brien, of Alberton, P.E.I., top driver on the Grand Circuit last year, will drive a darkhorse, Spike Hanover. He was to have driven Hickory Pride, but that horse showed a slight lameness Monday and was scratched.

Track officials said the carefully conditioned one-mile Duquoin track dries out in a few hours under sunshine. Fair promoters waited hopeful Tuesday for the clouds to roll away.

Continued rainfall might force postponement of the big race until Thursday. In the unlikely event of four days of rain, the race would be cancelled and the purse divided among the entries.

# Ernie Patts Takes WIFU Scoring Lead

WINNIPEG (CP) — End Ernie Patts of Winnipeg Blue Bombers took over the scoring leadership in the Western Interprovincial Football Union last weekend by scoring five touchdowns against Saskatchewan Roughriders to bring his total for the season to 36 points.

Patts' total is made up of six touchdowns, five of them scored on passes from quarterback Jim Van Pelt as the Bombers swamped the Roughriders 61-8 last Saturday in Regina.

Second place in the standings, as compiled by The Canadian Press, is held by kicking specialist Vic Kristopaitis, the British Columbia Lions' guard, who has eight field goals, seven converts and two singles for 33 points. Kristopaitis scored all the Lions' points as they edged Edmonton Eskimos 8-7 Monday night.

Halfback Don Stone of Calgary Stampeders moved into third place in the standings with 30 points after scoring two touchdowns Monday night in a 28-10 Calgary win over Saskatchewan.

Gerry James of Winnipeg Blue Bombers has 25 points from four touchdowns and a convert while Doug Brown of Calgary has a similar total from 13 converts and four field goals.

Van Pelt of the Bombers is next in line with 22 points, including one touchdown, 11 converts, a field goal and two singles.

Four players are tied with 18 points each. They are end Jerry James of the Lions, halfback Leo Lewis of Winnipeg, fullback Earl Lunsford of Calgary and fullback Johnny Bright of Edmonton.

# Canada Beats Netherlands In Fencing Team Competition

CHICAGO (CP) — Canada won her match with The Netherlands Antilles 10-6 in Pan American games fencing team competition Tuesday after losing an earlier tied match with Venezuela.

Both Canada and The Netherlands Antilles have one victory and one loss after two rounds of competition. The Antilles scored a first-round victory when it defeated Chile.

In the last Canadian match Carl Schwende of Montreal, Abey Silverstone, a native of Montreal, and John Andru of Toronto tied the Canadian team, each scoring 3-1. Nicholas Hilhorst was top man for The Netherlands Antilles, also with 3-1.

In its earlier match, The Netherlands Antilles split their 16 matches with Chile but were awarded the match victory also on the basis of the least touches received.

The third round will match Argentina against Argentina. Venezuela meets The Netherlands Antilles and Cuba will vie with Canada. The U.S. drew a bye and will not compete until the fourth round.
