THE ROPED ARENA.—It is announced that "Mysterious Billy" Smith has arranged a match with George Byers at Buffalo, Oct. 18. They will box twenty rounds.

THE RECORD LOWERED.—The steamer Prince Edward has again lowered the record between Boston and Yarmouth. The new time is thirteen hours, thirty-six minutes.

AN ISLANDER DROWNED.—Patrick Goodfellow, fifty years old, said to be a Prince Edward Islander, was drowned at Exeter, N. H., last week while working about the wharves.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—The Halifax Herald says:—A. D. Johnston had a narrow escape at the corner of Duke and Hollis streets. He was standing in the middle of the street, when an express team containing two large sample trunks came along. The horse knocked Mr. Johnston down and one of the wheels of the waggon passed over him, causing painful injuries.

SHIPPED FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Farmers says: The Northumberland took a large freight on Wednesday morning, amongst which were 600 lambs and sheep shipped to American markets by Mr. S. H. Jones, who crossed over with them to Point du Chene; 350 cases of eggs for the British market; about 200 barrels of oysters, and 12 packs of wool. The Northumberland returned in readiness to convey Lord and Lady Aberdeen from Summerside to Point du Chene in the afternoon.

WILL DIE FROM HER BURNS.—At McKenzie's Corner, near Richmond, Carleton Co., Mrs. Thos. Morgan, aged 75, was so badly burned on Saturday last that she will die. She was alone with her husband, aged 85, at the time, when the house caught fire and burned so rapidly that Mrs. Morgan's clothing caught fire while she was making her escape. When a neighbor arrived on the scene her clothing was a mass of flame. A leather belt around her waist was burned into the flesh. Her husband escaped with slight injuries.

THE NEW GAS COMPANY.—Things are quite lively down near the Gas Works now. A new main is being laid over to Rattenbury's to supply the new building, and we understand that after the arrival of the next English steamer some of the new gas plant will be erected. The new company will open an uptown office and show rooms by November 1st, where all kinds of gas heaters, furnaces, ranges, hot water, boilers, etc., will be exhibited, also the new incandescent gas burner and a great variety of fixtures and globes. Technical journals state that the present output of gas in the various cities has never been equalled, and that this is accounted for by the popularity of the new burner and the great amount of gas used for heating and cooking. St. Paul, Min. gas company's business increased twenty-eight per cent, largely owing to the above fact. Charlottetown people are promised a pleasant surprise when the new company gets things in shape.
